Please remember them in your prayers as they prepare to take on these duties.

### Visiting

Visiting is part of the Church's Ministry. If you would like a visit from the church, please call the Benefice Office and we will do our best to arrange it.

If you are going into or in hospital... You can help to make sure that the church team can respond as you would like us to when you are ill.

It's important that if you are admitted to hospital, you do three things:-

- 1. Make sure someone tells one of the ministry team that you are going into hospital ask them to pass on the message as appropriate.
- 2. Make it plain to the hospital staff whether (or not!) you would like a visit. This means that when someone rings up, they won't have to spend time saying 'hang on, 'I'll just ask him/her...'
- 3. Make it plain what sort of visit you would like: would you prefer a friend from the church or one of the visiting team or would you particularly like a clergy visit? If you want to be certain of a private, one to one chat, don't be afraid to ask the hospital staff if they will allow your minister to come outside normal visiting hours, so that they don't take up precious time and space from your family.

IT'S ALL ABOUT COMMUNITY - ISN'T IT?

Can you imagine what Cromhall would be like without a Village shop and Post Office?

Well about 20 years ago the local residents found themselves in exactly that situation. After a few months a number of people got together to see how practical it would be to open their own Community Shop and Post Office. As a result with the support of the whole village one of the first community shops in the UK opened in a portacabin. Things have moved on since then and we now have a purpose built shop in Townwell. With on-line shopping and now most people mobile you may think that we are no longer relevant in today's society but I think you would be wrong. Our shop still has much to offer the community.

### There are five ways that you can support your local Village Shop & Post Office:

- Become a regular customer. If you have never set foot in the shop then come along and have a look, you may be surprised. If every household spent £5 per week then our viability would be guaranteed.
- Join the team as a volunteer. You can work anything from 2 4.5 hours per week either as a regular shift or on an ad hoc basis supporting the shop during holiday periods. It is the quickest way to meet your neighbours. You do not have to be retired and we welcome any age because without the support of the volunteers the shop could not go forward.
- Become a member of the association for a one of payment of £10. This entitles you to money off vouchers to spend during the year.
- Join the shop committee. You do not have to work in the shop to be a member.
- Perhaps a fresh pair of eyes could identify areas where we could improve.
- We will need a new chairman at the end of 2018. Once again you do not have to work in the shop.
   Could you be that person to take us forward into 2019? If you have Chair experience in any field perhaps you could help us. Even if you do not your enthusiasm would be welcome.

When the original shop was opened in the portacabin all those years ago life was so different and the demographics of the village has changed so much. There is still a need for shops like ours but they can only thrive with your support. You may not need us now but you might in the future, so please support us and make sure we are here for you.





Despite strong opposition from residents, at a meeting of the Development Control Committee in December, South Gloucestershire Councillors have granted planning permission for 57 new homes in Tytherington, (28 off Duck Street, 29 off Stowell Hill Road) and 85 new homes in Falfield near the A38/ M5 junction. The development at Falfield will also provide a "Park and Share" facility for up 100 cars, a village green, equipped natural play area, community allotments and orchard, landscaping and sustainable drainage features. The development also proposes a Community Hub building.

### **Falfield Parish Council Report**

At their November meeting Councillors acknowledged the commitment given to the Parish Council over the previous seven years by Councillor Jane Hathway who had decided to step down from the Council for personal reasons. The resignation of Jane Hathway resulted in the election of a new Chairman with Emma Jarvis being elected as Chairman and Andrew Gregory as Vice Chairman.

The issue of the street lighting in Church Avenue and Eastley Close was again discussed and although nothing positive could be reported communications between the Parish Council and the Ministry of Justice Estate along with the assistance of Luke Hall, MP, was progressing albeit slowly.

Also at the meeting Councillors agreed the financial budget for 2018/2019 which will result in the parish precept of £6,553.00. This is an increase of £93.00 (1.44%) over the precept set for 2017/2018. Councillors also agreed to replace the existing parish notice board on the village green which was now past economical repair.

Councillors decided to call a special meeting on Wednesday, 3rd January in order to discuss the Councils response to the latest Joint Spatial Plan (JSP) consultation which was due to close for public comment on 10th January 2018.

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### **World Leprosy Day 2018**

World Leprosy Day takes place on the last Sunday in January, a date chosen by French humanitarian Raoul Follereau in 1953. However, The Leprosy Mission in England and Wales encourages people to mark the special day at any time between the end of January and the end of April.

The day aims to raise global awareness of a disease that many people believe to be extinct, when in fact around 210,000 new cases are diagnosed each year, and it's possible that millions more people are living undiagnosed. It is also a way to raise awareness of the fact that it can be prevented, treated and cured.

The following story shows how the effects of leprosy can act like chains which imprison sufferers, if they are not treated, and prevents them from living useful lives.

Saoude (the little girl pictured next to her mum and granny) is a bright and vivacious eight-year-old with high hopes of training to be a nurse when she grows up. She says she can then make people like her granny better.

Her grandmother, Habsou, came from a poor family who moved around daily to find food. In Niger, the sun-scorched earth lacks nutrients, rainfall can be very scarce and few crops can grow.

Habsou was just five years old when the first signs of leprosy appeared on her body. It was recommended that her parents take her to Danja Hospital where The Leprosy Mission has provided services for decades. Her parents, however, did not want her to go because of the shame surrounding the disease. The fear of their whole family being rejected from their community was just too great.

Instead Habsou was given traditional medicine and hidden away in a hut for many years. Her freedom to play outside with the other children was taken from her, and leprosy worsened. The chains of leprosy began to wrap their way around her.

Habsou finally came to Danja Hospital aged 13. By then she had already lost her fingers and toes and her sight was fading. Leprosy had savagely attacked her body. Over the coming years, her leprosy was treated and her wounds were tended.

As an adult, Habsou was only able to feed her family by begging, she was simply too disabled to work. Her leprosy-affected husband died when she was pregnant with their youngest child Mariama. When Mariama was 15, Habsou told her to marry a leprosy-affected man much older than her as she could no longer afford to keep her. Mariama was considered tainted and 'dirty' even though she had never had leprosy herself. No boy from a respectable family would ever consider marrying her.

It was against Mariama's will to marry this older man but she had no choice. She soon became pregnant with Saoude. The chains of leprosy had wrapped themselves around 15-year-old Mariama.

Today, Saoude goes to primary school in Danja village and her world seems full of possibility. Saoude does not yet wear the chains of leprosy but the threat of them is not far away. If she cannot get a good education, she too will be forced to marry young as her parents won't be able to afford to look after her. She will have to marry someone from the leprosy community and not of her choosing. She will undoubtedly be sentenced to a life of poverty, barely surviving because of the chains of leprosy. An education and a job can save her from all of this. Saoude will be able to look after her parents and grandmother with the money she earns. There is a possibility of freedom for Saoude!

We shall be marking World Leprosy Day in the benefice on Sunday 11th February with a visit to Tortworth from Trevor Grant, TLM's Regional Manager.

### All you need to know about January


According to folklore, everything you do on New Year's Day will influence your luck in the coming year. (My mother was always most insistent that no washing should be done on this day as it would 'wash the head of the family away'.) Apparently nothing should be taken out of the house today - not even rubbish, so clearing up after the New Year's Eve party will have to be left until tomorrow. It's especially important that you don't lend fuel or matches, or pay bills, lest you lack fire and money during the coming year. If it is absolutely necessary to carry something out, make sure that you bring something in first - preferably a coin, concealed outside on the previous night.

> Take out, then take in Bad luck will begin Take in, then take out Good luck comes about.

On 4th January one should make your cake for Twelfth Night (6th January).

### 'To make a Twelfth Cake:

Put two pounds of butter in a warm pan and work it to a cream with your hand: then put in two pounds of loaf sugar sifted; a large nutmeg grated; and of cinnamon ground, allspice ground, ginger, mace and coriander each a quarter ounce. Now break in eighteen eggs by one and one, meantime beating it for twenty minutes or above; stir in a gill of brandy; then add two pounds of sifted flour, and work



it a little. Next put in currants four pounds, chopped almonds half a pound; citron the like; and orange and lemon peel cut small half a pound. Put in one bean and one pea in separate places, bake it in a slow oven for

four hours, and ice it or decorate it as you will.'

The 13th January is St Hilary's Day, traditionally the coldest day of the year, when marriages were once more permitted after the Advent and Christmas ban.

Cold weather seems to have been at the forefront of people's

minds at this time. In frosty weather it was advisable to check your stored fruit and make apple tarts (presumably to use the apples up before the frost ruined them).

'If the frost be very extreme,' and you fear the endangering of your fruit, it is good to cover them somewhat thick with fine hay, or else to lay them covered all over either in barley chaff or dry salt; as for laying them in chests of juniper or cypress, it is but a toy, and not worth the practice. If you hang apples in nets within the air of the fire, it will keep them long, but they will be dry and withered, and lose their best relish.'

### 'To make Apple-tart.

Take apples and peel them, and slice them thin from the core into a pan with white wine, good store of sugar, cinnamon and rosewater, and so boil all till it be thick. Then cool it and strain it, and beat it very well together with a spoon, and then put it inot your coffin or crust and bake it. It carrieth the colour red.' Markham: The English Housewife 1683

As the month progresses, the days begin to lengthen, although apparently 'As the days lengthen so the cold strengthens.' Perhaps those who decided to sleep through it all have the right idea.

### 27th January

'On this day in 1698 Samuel Clinton, a labouring man of Timsbury near Bath, awoke in good health from having slept continually since November the 19th 1697 - on which day he had awoken briefly to ask for bread and cheese, but had fallen asleep again before he could eat it. Previous to that date, he had slept solidly since August the 17th; and before that ..... From April the 9th until August the 7th 1697 .... All efforts to arouse him (even by injecting smelling salts up his nostrils, or running a great pin into his arm to the bone) had proved in vain.'
