Men's Health: Living with Depression (and ignoring it!)

It is a fact that three out of four suicides are by men, and suicide is the biggest cause of death for men under 35 (ONS, 2015). Of course, suicide is an extreme example of the impact of severe depression, but 12.5% of *all* men in the UK are suffering

from one of the common mental health disorders.

Men who are depressed are more likely to talk about the physical symptoms of their depression, such as feeling tired, or having a problem concentrating, rather than symptoms

related to emotions, and are less likely to show more "typical" signs of depression such as sadness. It is more accepted for men to deal with stress, emotions and situations with anger and aggression. Anything else is interpreted as vulnerability and shut down. Men are almost 50% more likely than women to never seek medical support for a mental health problem¹.

I lived with moderate depression, on and off, for years, without ever recognising it or doing anything to tackle it. I now realise that for me it probably started in my early twenties; I didn't go to my degree award ceremony because I didn't think I deserved it! With hindsight, it seems obvious, but without any identifiable life event that might be blamed for triggering what the doctors refer to as 'low mood' it's easy not to believe there might be a medical cause, and just blame yourself. This is the most common cause of a downward spiral that seems at the time impossible to break.

As you probably gather from the fact I am writing this, I did eventually recognise my own illness. Not unusually, it was a comment from someone else that made me think, and it was a questionnaire on my GP surgery web site that made me realise I needed to seek help. It wasn't easy to say things to a doctor I hadn't even said to my wife & family, I made a list to help me keep it together, but I didn't need to get even half way through it before help was offered.

It is no exaggeration to say that was a turning point. For moderate depression medication was appropriate, but the very fact I had discussed how I felt with someone felt a massive relief, and somehow made it easier to talk to others. The cycle of self-blame had been broken by diagnosis and acceptance. I had depression, and it wasn't the end of the world.

A course of Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) helped me understand my own thoughts and behaviours, and how they affected me. Feeling better, I began to take more exercise, and found that really helpful. Over-eating was one of my symptoms, so when my mood improved I was able to lose weight – helped by the exercise – and that improved my self-image. I found I was able to read a book again, now that my concentration had improved. Of course, working became easier too, and I lost less time through hiding in bed.

Ninety percent of those who have had three episodes of depression will have a fourth. Depression is a medical condition that changes your brain. However, seeking help means that both the sufferer and those close to them can see the signs, and take steps to prevent it becoming serious.

I would urge other men who might be suffering the symptoms of depression to get help, it really is the 'manly' thing to do, and is quite the opposite of being weak! Don't leave it as long as I did.

If you are going into or in hospital... You can help to make sure that the church team can respond as you would like us to when you are ill.

It's important that if you are admitted to hospital, you do three things:-

- Make sure someone tells one of the ministry team that you are going into hospital – ask them to pass on the message as appropriate.
- Make it plain to the hospital staff whether (or not!) you would like a visit. This means that when someone rings up, they won't have to spend time saying 'hang on, 'I'll just ask him/her...'
- 3. Make it plain what sort of visit you would like: would you prefer a friend from the church or one of the visiting team or would you particularly like a clergy visit? If you want to be certain of a private, one to one chat, don't be afraid to ask the hospital staff if they will allow your minister to come outside normal visiting hours, so that they don't take up precious time and space from your family.


To all Cromhall Residents

A Parish meeting was held on June 6th.

The annual accounts were approved and will be available for inspection at the Estate office until 14th July.

Main areas of discussion were:

- Planning and Development Councillor O'Neill reported that work on Neighbourhood Plans for Charfield, Thornbury and Cromhall are ongoing and at different stages of the process. The next draft of the West of England Spatial and Transport Policies will be published over the summer.
- On local planning issues alterations there is a pending listed building planning application on 4, Avening Green for reroofing. An application to clad greenhouses at Tortworth Business Park has been approved.
- The Meeting discussed the **Electoral Review for South Gloucestershire**. The Electoral Commission are proposing to reduce the number of councillors by nine to 61. The meeting felt strongly that the existing Charfield Ward should not be changed.


There were no particular **transport** issues but the Parish Meeting would be interested to hear of any issues.

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RAGWORT ALERT

Imagine this: You stop eating. You get stomach pains. You're losing weight – fast. You have no energy. The sun hurts your skin. You lose co-ordination. You're struggling to breathe. Now you're going blind. Worst of all, you can't tell anyone how bad you feel – and even if you could, it's too late for them to help you.



This is what you would experience if you were a horse suffering from liver failure as a result of ragwort poisoning.

Ragwort is poisonous to horses, damaging the liver when eaten. The toxic effect builds up over time, causing irreparable damage

It is widely accepted that the plant loses its unpleasant taste when it dies but it is still just as dangerous. This means that ragwort found in hay or haylage, or leaves

that have fallen off a plant in the field and died, can very easily be eaten unknowingly and will be just as harmful as a living plant.

- 1. Ragwort seedlings start to appear in autumn. They are about 10-15mm high.
- 2. Ragwort rosettes can be found from early spring onwards.
- 3. Mature plants flower from May to October and can reach up to two metres in height.

After flowering, most of the plants die and the seeds germinate in the area where the mature plant had been. One plant can produce many thousands of seeds which are covered with a downy substance so they can be easily dispersed by the prevailing wind. They can also be spread by water or by you and your animals.

The plant is also harmful to humans, so it is essential to wear protective gloves and cover arms and legs when handling it. Ragwort should be removed before it flowers, but if this is not possible use a face mask to avoid inhaling the pollen. If you do come into contact with the plant, thoroughly wash the area in warm, soapy water.

The easiest way to remove a small number of plants is by pull-



ing the whole plant up, including the roots. Ragwort can regenerate from root fragments, so it is important to remove as much of the root as possible.

Ragwort should be disposed of carefully; most effectively by burning, taking all relevant precautions. Defra can advise on this and other methods of ragwort disposal. Ragwort control is an ongoing process. As the seeds can remain in the ground for many years before they germinate, you are likely to find that you will have plants to remove year after year. Barbecue safety



- Keep a bucket of water, sand or a garden hose nearby for emergencies.
- Follow the safety instructions provided with disposable barbecues.
- Never use a barbecue indoors.
- Never leave a barbecue unattended.
- Make sure your barbecue is well away from sheds, fences, trees, shrubs or garden waste.
- Use enough charcoal to cover the base of the barbecue, but not more (normally around 5cms or 2 inches).
- Keep children, pets and garden games away from the cooking area.
- After cooking, make sure the barbecue is cool before moving it.
- Empty ashes onto bare garden soil, not into dustbins or wheelie bins. If they're hot, they can melt the plastic and cause a fire.
- Enjoy yourself, but don't drink too much alcohol if you are in charge of the barbecue.

Never use petrol or paraffin to start or revive your barbecue; use only recognised lighters or starter fuels on cold coals.

Gas barbecues

- Never store gas cylinders under the stairs if there is a fire they might explode and block your escape route.
- Store gas cylinders outside, away from direct sunlight and frost.
- Take care when turning bottled gas barbecues on and off.
- Make sure the tap is turned off before changing the gas cylinder.
- After cooking, turn the gas supply off first and then the barbecue control. This will stop any gas from leaking.
- If you suspect a leak, turn off the gas cylinder and try brushing soapy water around all joints, watching for bubbles.
- Make sure all joints are tightened, safe and secure.
- Change gas cylinders outdoors or in a well ventilated area.

What is a firefighter on the retained duty system?



A firefighter on the Retained Duty System (RDS) provides an on call part-time service, responding to fire and emergency calls using the same appliances and equipment as Wholetime firefighters. The difference is that RDS firefighters are on call in their homes or work places rather than at a fire station. This role offers flexible working hours and could suit people with childcare responsibilities.

As an RDS firefighter you need to live or work within five minutes travelling distance of your local retained fire station during your hours of declared availability. Retained firefighters can choose whether to provide part cover (days, nights, weekends), or full cover (approx 24/7).

Being an RDS firefighter is like having a part-time job – you have to commit to certain hours and you get paid for it.
