Cromhall Parish Council

In the July Parish Council meeting the council received a presentation from CRSP (Cromhall Road Safety Group). The first major project they are planning is for some speed cameras similar to those operating in Kingswood. It was good to see the progress however there appear to be a number of hurdles to overcome before this can become a reality.

Bibstone Village Green

The grass areas outside of the Royal Oak pub are part of Bibstone village green which is maintained by Cromhall Parish Council. You will have noticed that last year we retarmacked the access road crossing the green, making the approach safer and improving the look of the area.

Village greens are for recreation not parking, and as a council we have been taking some actions recently to prevent cars and vehicles from parking on the grass.

You will have noticed rocks appear 2 months ago on the right-hand side of the road, this appears to be successful in stopping parking on the right. However, the council asks that people refrain from parking on the left-hand side, otherwise more rocks may have to be installed there incurring further costs to the community.





CANCER RESEARCH UK

CRUK Committee Celebration

Thornbury and District Cancer Research Committee has recently celebrated raising a total of £1 million.

Fundraising began in 1977 when a small group of people in the area recognised that research was the best way to beat cancer but that 'research costs money'. This resulted in the formation of the Thornbury and District Cancer Research Committee, which, from the very beginning, was intent on bringing the disease into the spotlight.

Cancer Research UK [CRUK] depends entirely upon voluntary donations for its work, and the local committee leads the way in generating vital fundraising. This would not have been possible without the hard work and dedication of the committee members over the years, as well as the generous and loyal people in the community who have supported many of the group's events.

'Friends of the Committee', was formed in 1989 for



much needed extra help. Friends have changed over the years, but, it was appropriate on the day that some of those joined in the

celebratory tea, hosted by Cancer Research UK, who were well represented by Head of Fundraising, Trudy Stammer, Regional Fundraising Manager, Sam Williams, and Fundraising Team Member, Louise Gash. On behalf of CRUK, Trudy expressed their appreciation of the fundraising by the group over the past 45 years and thanked everyone who had shared this great achievement.

A short talk was given by mathematician Dr.Colin Campbell, one of Bristol's scientists, who explained how statistics and probability are used in research. He confirmed that drug discovery and development requires many resources: time, money and ideas. Mathematics is being used increasingly in the biopharma industry and provides extraordinarily good value, given their potential impact and comparative cost of running clinical trials.

Awards were given for 'Long Term Service' to Margaret Powell (30 years); Pam Forrest (35 years), and Mary Hurford Jones, founder member of the group (45 years), A cheque for £8,000 was presented towards the goal of a second £million, in the hope that one day all cancers will be cured.

Special thanks go to Taylor and his team at The Ship, for their generous support in making the occasion so special.

Ron Holpin 1942 - 2022

Ron was born in Sawmill Lane, Thornbury, but his paternal origins lay in Tytherington where his involvement with Tytherington Rocks Football Club was long-lasting,

In 1974-5 Ron joined Tytherington Rocks as manager and played on occasion; his last game was played in 1983 but his skills were not confined to playing or managing; he also produced match day programmes - evidence of his considerable IT skills.

He worked with his brother Ted and others on improving the facilities of the football club and initiated numerous projects as the club successfully moved from the lower reaches of local football to the Bristol Suburban Premier League in the 1980s. One of the major improvements in the late 1970s was the installation of electricity, new showers and toilet block, thus consigning candlelight and The Rocks' famous tin bath to history.

Fund-raising was always needed to keep the club going and when their then goalkeeper, Steve Smith, did a sponsored walk from Land's End back to Tytherington, Ron and his wife Sue followed him by car with the necessary support to enable Steve to complete the distance. Ron did many things to raise money and keep the club going over a long period.

As President of Tytherington Rocks F C Ron always took a keen interest in what was going on at the ground, and on several occasions brought County Representative football teams up to The Hardwicke Field in Tytherington to play against other counties.

Ron's interest in sport also led to being heavily involved in the world of skittles, which he entered at the age of thirteen as a 'sticker-up', later graduating to become a player for various teams. In 1975 he became Secretary of the Thornbury and District Skittles League. Later he became President and wrote a book about its history to mark the first fifty years of its existence in 2005. The research that went into that was painstakingly conducted and included interviews with former players, as well as a thorough trawling of past Gazette reports.

In 1958 Ron began an association with Falfield Cricket Club, eventually becoming its chairman in 1994. However, by this time it was clear that the club could not continue for much longer and it merged with Tytherington until that club also folded. Keen to preserve the history of the Falfield club, Ron ensured that four boxes of invaluable information were passed to Gloucester Archives, so that anyone researching the history of Falfield Cricket Club would be able to access them. When the Falfield club finally ended, Ron moved to play for Tytherington until that also folded.

Organisational skills were high on Ron's list of talents, evidence of which was clear in his role as Club Secretary of Gloucestershire County Football League. He was the driving force behind making the Gloucestershire County one of the most respected Step 7 leagues in the country.

A colleague commented that, "The standards which he set led to the League becoming the envy of a very wide geographical area and the name of Ron Holpin has become synonymous with football in Gloucestershire; it is richer for it."

We extend our sympathy to his wife Sue, and family.

Local charity urgently needs new Trustees

Thornbury Area Youth Music Trust (TAYM) is urgently seeking new Trustees to join the board. The charity provides high-quality music tuition and activities for children aged 4-18 based at Manorbrook School where over 100 children come together on Saturday morning during term time.

Youngsters have the opportunity to play in small and large ensembles, with regular performances to parents and friends throughout the year. Despite lockdowns, TAYM continued to provide music tuition and online performance opportunities for its students; it is now back running faceto-face activities at Manorbrook School.

Trustees do not need any music background, nor do they do need to be a parent of a child in the centre. Anyone is welcome who believes it is important for young people to have access to music education, can bring new ideas, or help with the governance of the centre.

TAYM is managed by the Head of Centre, an Administrator and a Treasurer working with a team of dedicated music tutors. Trustee Board Meetings take place around 8-10 times per year and are currently held on-line. FALFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

The July meeting of the Parish Council was held on Tuesday 19th July 2022. In the absence of Councillor Jarvis the meeting was chaired by Vice Chair Councillor Gregory with a total of three Councillors present along with Charfield Ward Cllr O'Neil and two members of the public which included the Chair of Falfield Village Hall Management Committee who provided an update to Councillors on the progress on the planned improvements to the Village following a receipt of a grant from the Council earlier in the year.

A presentation was also given by Alex Godwin of Billy Colours who has been commissioned by Linden Homes to undertake a community engagement project, aiming to link to the new Falfield Grange development with the existing community in Falfield, and thinking about how the old and new parts of the village can connect and integrate their activities.

Later in the meeting Cllrs approved at number of items, which included, the replacement of the fence on the village green, bringing permanent electricity supply onto the green and the replacement of a notice board all to be funded from the Community Infrastructure Levy income.

Councillors also discussed and commented where necessary on a number of Consultations that the Council had received.

As usual the draft minutes will be published no later than twenty-one days of the meeting on the Parish Councils website.

The next Council meeting will be held on **Tuesday 20th September** in the Village Hall commencing at 7.30pm.





Life as a Student Teacher in Saffron Walden 1887 - 1888

This is the second part of an article written by the head of a school in which the mother of one of our readers worked in the 1920s/30s.

The Pupil Teacher's education was the responsibility of the Head, who questioned each one from 8 - 9am or 12 noon – 1 o'clock; most of the education was learning from memory from text books. History meant dates, Geography, lists of places. Sometimes 'Any questions' was not a happy time – the Head would get impatient and throw a book across the room.

At the end of each year the Pupil Teacher had a Government Examination. After the fourth year it was necessary to pass the scholarship Examination to obtain entry into a training College. The students paid a fee but the colleges were Grant Aided – probably by Results.

My college was Saffron Walden. We were received there one cold January night by the two principals: Misses Steele and Stoker. Both always were lace mob-caps and black gowns – both were kind and sympathetic. The food was very good and the atmosphere happy. There was a good kindergarten attached to the college - truly Froebel – the children free and happy under ideal conditions. Fees high – we practised here. What a contrast to the city school to which I was appointed with 60 to 70 in a class – ill-nourished and dirty. My ideals were shattered. Here, education meant the 3Rs, **method** did not matter. The child, a machine, which must produce output as a Code required and expected. The small salaries of the Head Teacher must not be lessened by inefficient output.

After four years I was asked to become Head of a poor school. A kind friend advised – 'Don't go' for the teachers get stoned every night on their way home. This was an exciting thought, but poverty and the hard way of life stimulated sympathy and so a happy link was forged between school and home. Within the building the school was drab – thick glass prison-like windows which no sun could penetrate, ventilation was bad - the school was a nursery for disease - the seats had no backs – long desks stretching back in many rows – with two classes in the main room. My appeals for better conditions failed and I was told after several attempts, not to appeal again. Public opinion has altered and now there is a tendency to spend too much on new buildings. Present day teachers should sometimes think of those pioneers who day by day did their duty under bad conditions.

Some country teachers even had to sweep and clean their schools. In my school many of the parents were very poor, living in homes which periodically flooded. There was little or no outdoor relief** - people preferred to stay in their homes and starve rather than enter the workhouse. Sometimes children were kept in bed for warmth. A volunteer organisation in my district arranged free breakfasts for the worst cases, so during the winter, before morning school the hungry were fed.

My second school contained a mixture of well and ill clad children. As yet, there was no medical inspector. Parents would not keep the children's heads clean. There was a narrow street where women seemed to spend their lives at the door. Inquiries found that with very little furniture, there was nothing to clean, very little food meant nothing to cook, and few clothes meant nothing to wash. The language was bad – something the Vicar tried to remedy. Many mothers had no knowledge of the care of children. Thus at 9.45 one morning a babe was in the arms of a little sister who was giving it a packet of sherbet.
