#### Changing times .....

Where were you on the evening of 15<sup>th</sup> January 2003? It seems that nine of us were at a meeting in the new rectory in Cromhall. Having recently returned from a thirty-three-year sojourn in Lancashire, I had decided to go along to offer my services to do 'a bit of typing' for the local newsletter, then known as CTT News.

The newsletter's origins lay in Tytherington where it had been instigated by Alice Johnson as a means to keep the parish informed of activities largely connected with the church but as the benefice was extended eventually to five parishes, Alice felt it was time for her to step back. The then rector, Pat Lyes-Wilsdon, summoned volunteers to meet and discuss the way forward.

We wanted a magazine which was for everyone – the whole community - to be able to relay local news, events, personal thanks or items of interest. We also felt that it should be edited, attractive, cost-effective and help integrate the five villages. A new name was clearly needed, along with new personnel and a new system for the finance, which should be accountable, audited and separate from church finances.

Initially most of the copy was hand-written and came in paper form. It was typed, put on a floppy disk, taken to the person who did the layout (and advertising), then handed back for proof-reading after which the disk was taken to Oldbury-on Severn for printing by the Oldbury Deckers. It's now put together by one person and sent online to the printers in Cam.

Goodness me, how times have changed over the past twenty years! (What's a floppy disk? I hear some say.) People are less reliant on a paper copy of anything. Facebook and other social media keep people informed of events in their neighbourhood and means that some local mags have either disappeared or gone completely online. And yet the spare copies left in the local shops, churches and post offices, and at Thornbury Library, are taken each month, so someone must appreciate a printed version. (What's more, according to a recent news item, it appears that bookshops are once again proving popular as some people prefer reading 'real' books to reading them online.)



#### Pat Child 1929 - 2022

Her family held a private service at Morton Chapel followed by a Thanksgiving service for her life at St Oswald's church Rockhampton, on Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> January 2023. It was attended by many, and the family want to thank everyone for their kind words and support.

Pat was the matriarch of a strong loving family. She was a wonderful Mother, Granny and Great Granny. She was a good friend, neighbour, and long-standing resident of Rockhampton.

Patsy Edith Pearce was born on 13<sup>th</sup> June 1929, she was one of six children. The family home was Woodburn Cottage in Duckhole, where she spent her childhood and went to school in Thornbury, walking across the fields to school or occasionally riding the farm horses to the blacksmiths and picking them up on the return from school.


After leaving school at the age of 14 Pat went to work as a housekeeper the Prowse family, who were local doctors, at Wigmore House, Castle Street, Thornbury; a job she really enjoyed, and she kept in touch with the family all her life.


At weekends Pat use to love going dancing with her friend Hilda Clark at the Cossham Hall in

Thornbury, and on Sundays her family would attend Morton Baptist chapel. It is here she first met John Child (Chick), when the Rockhampton boys came to the chapel meetings.

They married in June 1955 and Pat moved into Green Farm, Rockhampton, with her in-laws. Very soon the first of six children were born. To Pat her family was everything and nothing was too much trouble .She loved the village life too and was to be found at the centre of village occasions .

Green Farm was HQ for fete plans and floats. On Bonfire Night it would be Pat's kitchen where everything happened, all the food





Sadly, due to ill health, she left her beloved Green Farm after 65 years to live with her son Robert and daughter-in-law, Liz, until moving to Beech House . The nursing home is situated in Prowse Close with its own blue plaque to the Prowse family doctors. This would provoke stories of her time as a young woman, and she could share these with staff at the home.

One of Pat's grandchildren summed up the feelings of many of Pat's family and friends: 'I'll always remember her kindness, strength and unwavering support. We'll miss her greatly.'

#### **Cromhall Road Safety**

The Cromhall Road Safety Project is going from strength to strength as we work towards making the village a safer place to walk, ride and drive.

During December, the Community Speedwatch team carried out their first sessions to record the number of speeding drivers through the village. The information captured by the team is reported back to the Police who will contact repeat offenders.

Over two sessions, assessments carried out in 30mph areas recorded 24 speeding drivers. And those speeding drivers were doing around 40mph - 33% over the limit. Most of these drivers have been contacted by the Police. The percentage of speeding drivers recorded in Cromhall is around three times higher than the average found across the rest of the Avon and Somerset ar-

#### Work in Thornbury's Rock Street car park underway

Improvement works have started in Thornbury's Rock Street car park. During the works, from November 2022 – May 2023, the car park will be open at half capacity.

At the end of the works, in May 2023, the car park will be completely closed for two weeks for complete resurfacing before it fully re-opens.

The programme will take six months so that we can maintain 50% of the parking provision throughout construction (excluding the final two weeks).

The work is part of a £4.6 million programme of investment in Thornbury, to support a sustainable High Street that is fit for the future.

#### What will the new car park look like?

The new car park design reflects feedback from residents about the size of the spaces in the car park, availability of parent and child spaces and the location of the disabled parking bays.

- Parking spaces will be bigger
- More parent and child bays
- More EV (electric vehicle) charging points including a disabled EV charging bay
- Disabled parking bays will be closer to the crossing into the St Mary Centre

#### Where can I park in Thornbury during the works?

Thornbury has a range of free to park car parks within walking distance of the High Street.

- St Mary Street car park short stay
- Castle Court car park long and short stay
- Thornbury leisure centre long stay
- Rock Street car park (remains open with reduced capacity) long and short stay

#### **Eddie Gadsby 1924 - 2022**



Eddie Gadsby, who died in December 2022 at the age of 98, was a long-time resident of Falfield. Eddie was born on 19<sup>th</sup> May 1924 in Bournemouth where he liked nothing better than to be with the ponies on the beach. He also loved to be with the ponies when the circus arrived in the town; this love of horses was to have a huge effect on Eddie's future life.

At the age of eighteen he joined the RAF where his lack of height meant that he was unable to achieve his ambition to become a pilot, so trained as a navigator/wireless operator. When hostilities ended, he was posted to

No 2 Missing Persons Research and Enquiry unit in Germany.

With his military service ended, Eddie went on to study engineering at technical colleges in Bournemouth and Bristol, eventually joining BAC (later Rolls Royce) in 1950 where he later lectured in Engineering, Technical Drawing and English. It was here that he met Isabel browsing through a 'Horse and Hound' magazine during a lunch break at work, struck up a conversation with her and led to a marriage which lasted over sixty-four years until Isabel's death just over two years ago. Eddie's equine interests also figured prominently in his life as he served in various leading roles in the Avon and Border Counties Association of the Welsh Pony and Cob Society.

Having married in 1956, the couple initially lived in Redland before moving to Winterbourne where they first established a successful riding school as well as becoming involved with the local church where Eddie became a licensed lay-reader.

The move to Horseshoe Farm at Brinkmarsh and success of the new riding school there enabled Eddie to retire from his lecturing job in 1983 and led to a new direction in his life as he became involved in the fight against plans to build a new development of 1,500 houses in Falfield, which would effectively mean a new village.

In 1985 Eddie became chairman of the Falfield Action Group which successfully fought off the threat and it was this that really sparked his interest in politics. He became a Parish Councillor in 1987, serving until 2004 and as chair from 1989 - 2000. He was also a Northavon District Councillor for the Charfield ward for a time and became a governor at Charfield School.

Ten years after taking up his rôle with FAG, Eddie became the first chair of the newly formed South Glos Council in 1995. Amongst his other achievements he founded the Vale Link Community transport scheme in 1997, becoming chair of that organisation in 1998. Ultimately it merged with the Four Towns and is still serving the local community.

As a committed member of the South Glos Lib Dems, he became chair and later its president. He was made an honorary alderman of South Glos in 2003 ....and an honorary citizen of Alabama during a church trip to the US in 1990.

Following his years as a chorister in Bournemouth, Eddie maintained his interest in music and was very active on the choral music scene in Thornbury, most notably with Cadence. Eddie's faith was particularly important to him, and he was a regular worshipper at St George's, Falfield, where his organ-playing skills were well-known. He was a member of the PCC and lay-reader as well as a churchwarden. In recognition of his services to the Church and community, he was a recipient of the Royal Maundy money in 2003.

His faith both served and strengthened Eddie for all that he was able to do for others, but the time came for others to care for him; the family did their best but for Eddie life without Isabel was a struggle.

We offer the family our condolences in their loss.

#### We Grew Up in Falfield

Some years ago, Mrs Ann Riddiford, who had grown up in the village, wrote a book entitled 'We Grew Up in Falfield'. The book was sold to raise funds which were urgently needed for St George's Church. The book is now out of print but many have expressed an interest in it and perhaps a few extracts will be of interest, especially to those who have recently come to live in the area.

#### Setting the Scene (1)

Falfield parish is long and narrow in shape, and centred around the arterial road, the A38 which in its entirety connects Leeds to Exeter. The length of the parish is three to four miles and the width varies between one mile and two miles.

Falfield, which gives its name to the parish, contains all the components required to form a village: a parish church, a village pub and a village shop. In addition, there was once a village school complete with a head-teacher's house and a village smithy adjoining the village pound. In fact there were two or three inns in the central village at some time.\*

There were two turnpike gates with gate-keepers' cottages:

- A cottage which stood on the corner of Moorslade Lane opposite The Haven was owned by the Gloucester to Stone Turnpike Trust.
- A gate-keeper's house which stood on the corner of the old Tortworth Road junction (now Mill Lane), where 'The Downs' and 'The Villa' now stand, was owned by the Bristol to Chipping Sodbury Turnpike Trust.

This would indicate that Falfield (central) was a busy and thriving community.

There was a baker's shop where bread was baked daily in the old Falfield Garage, now the site of several houses on the south side of the Huntsman. The remains of the old bread oven could apparently still be seen in the old garage workshop. The attached general store sold other requirements too, mainly food. There was a village pond, - 'The Horse pool,'- near the Moorslade Lane

junction, practically opposite the Tortworth Road junction. The A38 went into a 'dippy' at this point. The pond had a 'pull-in' for horses and vehicles with a very low wall to stop people falling in. (Currently this is on the site where the footpath leads from Falfield Grange out to the traffic lights on the A38.)

One would imagine that a wheelwright's business must have existed somewhere in this part of the village, but there appears to be no evidence of this so far. Possibly such a business could have existed on the present village hall site, as it has been said that a number of horseshoes found in that location indicate a forge. A wheelwright's business was possibly incorporated with it. It would seem an ideal situation for carrying on such a trade.



This photograph, looking north, shows the junction of the A38 and Sundayshill Lane with the original Malvern House at the top of Mill Lane and the village school (now the village hall) opposite.

The village mill has always existed on, or around, the present site in Mill Lane and dates back to at least medieval times.

No doubt many other features and businesses have also existed that we have yet to discover. They will perhaps be revealed in old title deeds or other documents. Again, some sites have long since disappeared, and we shall probably never know of their existence.

Spidering out from the main Falfield village to the north is:

- The Holloway (on the Stone boundary)
- Falfield Green
- Heneage Lane (formerly Silver Street)
- Moorslade Lane (running through to Lower Stone)

#### Setting the Scene continued

\* In the eighteenth century there was a building referred to as 'The Falfield Inn' for which a new thatched roof was being ordered. This fact is recorded in the Thornbury records, as then Falfield was part of Thornbury parish, which it continued to be until 1863.

There was a pub called 'The Black Lion' standing opposite the present parish church. This was pulled down in the late nineteenth century. The last landlord to be there was a Mr Taylor, a relative of the Phillips family (Ron Phillips, Rose Baker and so on). He went to set up a pub in Cromhall following his landlordship of Falfield's 'Black Lion'. However, there appears to also have been a 'Red Lion Inn' according to an item in Nicholas Herbert's book 'Road Travel and Transport in Gloucestershire' (Alan Sutton, Glos. County Library Series 1985). In an extract from the Gloucester Journal dated 1763 it says:

To be let at Lady Day next, The Inn, called The Red Lion, mostly new-built, situate at Falfield, in the Parish of Thornbury, in the County of Gloucester, and adjoining to the Turnpike road lead-

Might this have been the forerunner of The Huntsman's House Inn? - Certainly there was stabling there, a feature only very recently removed to provide extra accommodation for guests. In addition, there may have existed a public house at 'The Nook'

#### **Falfield Parish Council**

The January meeting was held on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> January with all five Parish Councillors and our Charfield Ward Councillor in attendance along with four parishioners.

During Public Participation, a resident from the Falfield Grange development spoke of the issues and concerns that the residents of the Grange have in regard to the general condition of the Open Spaces area and that he believed a number of conditions of the planning application have not been met. He advised that discussions were continuing with both the Developers and the appointed Management Company to resolve these issues and would keep the Parish Council informed of the ongoing situation.

The Chairman of the Village Hall Management Committee gave an update on the refurbishment programme for the hall from the grant awarded by the Parish Council in March 2022. In his report, he confirmed that work would start soon on the refurbishment of the hall which would include a complete electrical rewiring; upgrading of the toilets; the addition of a disabled toilet and the opening up of the doorway from the lobby into the main hall to allow access for wheelchair users.

Under planning. Councillors discussed the application for erection of two secure blocks at HMP Eastwood Park. Councillors noted that a total of eight comments had been submitted by members of the public, all of which objected to this application. After further discussion Councillors unanimously agreed to object to the planning application on the grounds that:

- key information was not visible to the Parish Council or consultees, so questioned whether it was a valid public consultation process;
- Church Avenue, being an unadopted road, would be unable to take any additional traffic that this development would bring;
- there was insufficient additional parking proposed and no information on how foul and surface water would be handled;
- also, through its liaison with the prison consultants, that a further planning application was
  pending for the erection of three-house blocks in an open setting and therefore would urge
  the Case Officer to wait before making any decision on this application until the full extent of
  this additional development was known.

In other business Councillors agreed that the Parish Council should commemorate the Coronation of King Charles III and would look into the purchase of a commemorative bench.

The **next meeting** of the Parish Council is expected to take place on **Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> February**. Currently indications are that the hall will not be available as it will be closed for refurbishment and therefore if this were the case the meeting would take place at HMP Eastwood Park Training Centre on Monday 20<sup>th</sup> Final details for the date of the meeting will be available on the meeting agenda and published on the Parish Notice Board and Parish Council website during the week leading up to the meeting.
