### Hop on board for 2020


My phone's broken. Actually the speaker has broken. I was worried that the comments



If you are going into or in hospital... You can help to make sure that the church team can respond as you would like us to when you are ill.

It's important that if you are admitted to hospital, you do three things:-

- Make sure someone tells one of the ministry team that you are going into hospital – ask them to pass on the message as appropriate.
- Make it plain to the hospital staff whether (or not!) you would like a visit. This means that when someone rings up, they won't have to spend time saying 'hang on, 'I'll just ask him/her...'
- 3. Make it plain what sort of visit you would like: would you prefer a friend from the church or one of the visiting team or would you particularly like a clergy visit? If you want to be certain of a private, one to one chat, don't be afraid to ask the hospital staff if they will allow your minister to come outside normal visiting hours, so that they don't take up precious time and space from your family.



- The annual parish litter pick will take place on Saturday 21st March meet at 10am at The Estate Office hot drinks and bacon butties served afterwards. This is always well attended, very worthwhile and an opportunity to catch up with other parishioners so please come along it is only an hour.

#### A **Tortworth Parish Meeting** was held in on 3<sup>rd</sup> December.

The main areas of discussion were:

• Leyhill Prison – there were discussions on Leyhill Prison particularly relating to absconders and the category of prisoner. Parishioners wish to clarify the classification of prisoners held at the prison.

If any parishioner wishes to be notified when there is an absconder, please let the Parish Clerk know. Councillor O'Neill will write to the elected MP to try to obtain a meeting with Leyhill.

- The damaged bus stop sign at the crossroads has been replaced.
- Churchwood Quarry A number of parishioners had attended the parish presentations and the recent open days. Cemex will shortly be making a planning application for the new extension.

• Tortworth Court are now notifying the Clark when there is planned firework display. If any parishioner wishes to be informed, please let the Clerk know or contact Tortworth Court directly.

• Issues relating to the motorway lay by were discussed with parked vehicles blocking access to properties. This is to be taken up with South Gloucestershire Council.

• Finance – a precept of £200 was agreed for 2020/21. This is as for 2019/20. Planning

A small planning application for Cove Cottage was discussed. The parish was supportive.

There was the usual update on planning matters locally. The ongoing delay on the Joint Spatial Plan including Charfield and Buckover were noted.

Good progress on the Charfield Neighbourhood Plan was noted.


There was discussion on the development at Heneage Farm in Falfield which is likely to start soon together with the allocation of sports monies from the development.

Celebrate "Old Twelvey Night" with the Rockhampton Folk Festival

#### Friday 17th January 7.45pm Rockhampton Village Hall

Join Louis Bingham and Griselda Sanderson on 17 January to celebrate "Old Twelvey Night". This is the day that wassailers visited the cider orchards of England reciting incantations and singing to the trees for a good harvest for the coming year.

Louis and Griselda - a mother and son duo - keep alive the timeless traditions of a musical family. Louis plays fretted instruments such as the Celtic cittern, guitar, and Bulgarian tambura, and is an accomplished singer. Griselda plays bowed string instruments including the violin, the Norwegian Hardanger fiddle, and the Swedish nyckelharpa. Drawing on midwinter sessions around the hearth they've taken their diverse repertoires and combined them to create a distinctive duo sound and a repertoire reaches from Galicia to Norway, from Donegal to Piedmont, and many more places in between.

### Caring for a person with dementia

• **Know your limits** – It is important to remember that you are only one person and there is only so much that you can do. Try to focus on what you can do and accept the things that you can't.



- Prioritise When you have a lot of different things to do, it may help to prioritise.
  Work out which things you really need to do and which things are less important, and do the most important things first.
- **Don't compare yourself –** Try not to compare yourself or your situation to other carers. You may feel like they are coping much better than you, but everyone's situation will be different, and everyone has their own challenges to face. You may struggle with things that they find easy, but they may struggle with things that you cope with well.
- **Confront your feeling** It is important to try to understand why you feel the way you do, and accept any negative feelings that you have. You are not alone in feeling this way it is a normal reaction. Having negative feelings does not mean you are a bad person, and being aware of your feelings may make it easier to deal with them and move on. If you are feeling frustrated, try to work out why. Are you trying to do too much? Are you not getting the help you need? Once you have understood why you feel the way you do, you will be able to make clearer decisions about what is right for you and for the person you are caring for.
- **Talk about things** Talking is often the first step to dealing with your emotions. It may seem like a small thing, but it can make you feel less isolated and stressed, and it can help to put things in perspective. Bottling up your feelings, or not taking the time to address them, is likely to make things worse. This is bad for you as well as the person you care for. You might want to talk to an understanding professional – such as the GP, social worker or counsellor – or a good friend or family member. You can also speak anonymously to someone on a helpline or discussion forum such as Alzheimer's Society's Talking Point. If you feel that you're really struggling, speak to someone as soon as possible.
- **Talk to other carers** Talking about your experiences with other carers can also be hugely beneficial. You may be able to share advice and discuss your experiences. It may also be easier to talk about your feelings with other carers because they understand what you are going through. Carers' support groups or discussion forums such as Talking Point are ideal.
- Involve family and friends You may find involving family and friends helps to give you a break and reduce some of your stress. For some people they can provide a good range of support. Even if they can't offer day-to-day care, they may be able to look after the person while you have a break, or they might be able to assist in other ways, such as helping with finances. It may help to talk about dementia to the people you know. Tell them what life is like for you, and for the person you care for. This may help them understand how much you do and what help and support you need. It may also help to suggest ways that people can help sometimes they may not offer because they don't know what they can do. And if you say you can manage without help, people may not think to ask again. Remember to always let people know how valuable their support is.
- Ask for help Don't be afraid to ask for help and support if you need it. If you don't have any friends or family who can help, or need types of support they can't provide, a voluntary organisation or your local authority might be able to help. Find out whether there are any services available for you or the person with dementia in your local area. Alzheimer's Society's Dementia Helpline can help with this. Also see our 'Getting help and support' page at *www.alzheimers.org.uk*
- **Think positively** Pick out and focus on some of the positive aspects of caring and supporting someone, such as your commitment to the person you care for, and your fondness for them. Think about your relationship with them and the fact you are there for them and are helping them enormously.
- Focus on the good things Sometimes it can be hard to see the positive things that you are achieving in your caring role. Writing things down – even small things, such as a shared joke – might be useful. When you are having a difficult day, these things can remind you of the good you are doing and that there will be better times.
- **Take a break** You will be able to cope better if you take breaks away from the person you care for and find time for yourself. Try to find time to reflect and relax, enjoy personal interests and hobbies, and socialise with friends and family.


#### PARKINSON'S LOCAL SUPPORT GROUP IN THORNBURY





#### **Rockhampton Parish Council**

Rockhampton Parish Council met on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> November 2019 when among a number of issues Councillors approved the Parish Precept of £3,808.00 for 2020/21.

Ward Cllr M. Riddle reported on a number of highways actions that had been completed since the last meeting in August. He also reported that speed monitoring had taken place on the Lower Stone Road through the village which recorded an average speed over a 7 day period at 33.7 mph, however the 85% percentile speed (the speed that 85% of drivers will drive at or below under free-flowing conditions) was recorded at 42 mph. Based on these figures it was agreed that a meeting should be sought with South Gloucestershire Highways to see what, if any, calming measures could be implemented in order to further reduce the speed through the village.

The new Parish notice board was now in place at Newton and Cllr England offered to arrange for a named plaque to be fitted. The Clerk had also received a quote of £334.00 for the refurbishment of the notice board at the Wheel which Councillors approved for necessary repairs to be completed.

Councillors also discussed the future purchase of a defibrillator which Councillors hoped could be part funded by financial support from local businesses.

Following the meeting a presentation was made to the outgoing Clerk Mrs E Vaughan Lewis for her services as Clerk for the previous two years.
