Ella Wheeler Wilcox was an American author and poet, born in 1850 to a poor farm family in Wisconsin. The youngest of four children, her mother was fond of literature and encouraged her to develop a love for reading and writing. Her most famous poem was "Solitude," which contains the lines: "Laugh, and the world laughs with you; Weep, and you weep alone"

During her life, Wilcox received many rejection letters before a publisher gave her books of poetry a chance. Despite these rejections, Wilcox remained very optimistic. Her best-known poetry book was Poems of Passion (1883). She died in 1919.

Couple who were unable to afford food finally have desperate situation resolved nine months on thanks to Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire

Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire is highlighting how it helped a couple after they were left unable to afford food. Hannah* and David* both had to stop work in early 2023 when Hannah was diagnosed with a serious, long-term health condition that required full-time care. David gave up a full-time job to care for her while also living with a health issue of his own. (*Names have been changed to protect identities.)

They had never claimed benefits and were unaware they were eligible for state support, surviving on savings until these ran out. In January 2024 they applied for help from a local food bank. It was here that the couple were put in touch with Adviser Kate Eedy of Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire – through the charity's Food Bank partnership project.

Kate was able to help navigate them through the process of applying for benefits they were entitled to, a change of home and help from carers. Neither David nor Hannah was able to use a computer and only have access to the internet through a mobile phone - making it very difficult to access support such as benefits without help.

Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire organized an emergency payment of £80 worth of Tesco vouchers through the South Gloucestershire Council Welfare Grants scheme. Kate also secured a payment of £120 from a local charity.

Hannah and David's housing association property had stairs, which meant that Hannah was unable to access the upstairs any longer; as there was no downstairs bathroom this caused a lot of difficulties and stress. The housing association informed the couple they would have to pay for the substantial adaptations needed themselves or apply for a grant. This meant that a new home needed to be found.

Kate helped them through the process of applying for a new property and managed to secure a move from Band C to Band A, this allowed them to find a suitable property more quickly and they now live in a bungalow.

Hannah and David did not know that they were entitled to help from carers. Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire helped secure both a Carers and Needs Assessment

It took from January to September for the situation to be fully resolved, causing the couple immense stress and frustration during this time. David said: "It's been a pretty tough few years. I was so embarrassed to go to the food bank the first time. I didn't know what Universal Credit was but Kate sorted all that out - and PIP."

Falfield Parish Council Report

The November meeting took place on Monday 18th November 2024. Councillors noted that a response had been received from the Enforcement Team at South Gloucestershire Council following a concern raised by a parishioner at the October meeting regarding the height of the totem poles for the electricity substation on the Cotswold Homes site. The Enforcement Team advised that no breach of planning control had occurred.

In his report Ward Cllr O'Neill indicated that the two major housing developments in Charfield are expected to be determined in the near future. These are not expected to be refused given the current housing policy of the newly elected government.

Under finance Councillors approved the Council's budget and the Parish Precept for 2025/26. In the case of the Parish Precept this would rise from £10,864.00 to £11,075.00.

Following the October meeting, when it was approved to purchase a second Defibrillator and external cabinet, the Clerk informed the meeting the unit and cabinet had now arrived and that it was planned to have it fitted on to an external wall at the Village Hall before the end of the year.

Under highways no issues had been raised with StreetCare since the last meeting and all issues noted as open at the last meeting were unchanged although the Clerk reported that he did not have much confidence in the StreetCare Report It system to provide up to date accurate information. Councillors agreed that they would like to see further speed checks carried out and the Clerk was instructed to contact the South Gloucestershire Council Road Safety and Sustainable Travel Team to request vehicle behaviour data capture equipment on the A38 as it had been some time since any speed monitoring had taken place.

The next meeting of the Council is to be held on Monday 20th January 2024 in the Village Hall at 7.30 pm



Making connections!

Amongst the many and varied duties of a churchwarden is dealing with queries about those who have been baptised, married and buried at the church for which they have responsibility. At the beginning of July 2024, Fen Marshall received an email enquiring about relatives of Lieutenant Commander John Arthur Smith (Royal Naval Reserve). The enquiry came from a gentleman named George Dunnett who explained that his family had a telescope in their possession which he believed was originally the property of Lt Cdr Smith and that he believed it had come into their

possession following his death on the 28th January 1918 on board the SS Keelung.

George was keen to return the telescope to members of John Arthur Smith's family and, since a memorial stone to him was to be found in Tortworth churchyard, enquired as to whether Fen could provide any useful information regarding surviving members of the Smith family. Strangely enough, Fen passed this enquiry on to me.

I knew that the Smith family had lived in Tortworth for many years and were contemporaries of my great grandparents; indeed, Daniel Smith, who was the father of John Arthur, had originated from Iron

Acton, which was also the birthplace of my great grandmother, whose daughter had worked for the Smith family at Crockleys when she was a young girl. (I was later to discover that other family members had worked for them over many years, some in tragic circumstances.)

Daniel Smith and his wife, Sarah, farmed at Crockleys Farm for almost fifty years before retiring to Marsten Lodge on the estate. They produced eleven children of whom, according to the 1911 census, nine survived. However, they were to lose two more sons in the fighting of WW1, both of whose names appear on Tortworth's war memorial

The Smith family were influential members of the Tortworth community. Daniel was one of the Guardians of the Thornbury Union (Workhouse) representing Tortworth, as well as being a churchwarden for forty years.

Another of Daniel and Sarah's sons was the headmaster of Tortworth School after having first becoming a pupil in 1883. He went on to be a pupil teacher in 1894, then after becoming certificated, an assistant teacher from 1902. His rise continued and he became Headmaster in 1908, a post in which he remained, (with the exception of three years when he served in WW1 and his wife became Acting Head) until 1947.

George's determination to find living relatives led him to discover that, although Arthur had married, he and his wife had not had children, so the search continued until he found a surviving relative, Chris Honeyborne, who was able to tell him more about the family and to whom he will hand over the items which of which he has been the custodian.

Cameron, also studying at the Royal Academy of Music, was principal cellist of the Young Sinfonia at Sage Gateshead and was a member of the National Youth Orchestra in 2022, all leading to BBC performances including The Proms.

Dick Bryant 1949 – 2024

Dick was born at Woodleaze Farm Itchington to Eric and Frances, and loved the outdoor life. From about the age of three he had a trusty tricycle that went virtually everywhere with him, if he couldn't physically ride it then he would drag it around the farm. He often said it served him well riding it round and around the manure heap trying to escape from his mother.

His freedom was curtailed once he started his education at primary school and later passing the 11+ eventually following his older sisters Peggy and Bridget to Thornbury Grammar school as did Ivor his younger brother, Dick however always said he was only there to make up the numbers. It was considered an honour when he was selected to join the school rugby team, he was not so convinced especially when he had to play a match on a Saturday! He thought it bad enough attending school in the week! But! as an adult he revealed a secret, that at least once he succeeded in skipping school by taking an away day to London on the train with a friend.

At 16 years he continued his education in the department of engineering at Filton Technical College followed by a five year apprenticeship at Dando's, a local garage in Chipping Sodbury. During that time, besides learning a good trade there were many high jinks and camaraderie with his fellow apprentices. Seeing his van one morning in the yard they thought he had come in early but no, he was sound asleep in it after being out together the night before.

When fully qualified as a fitter he worked at various local transport firms and a plant firm before deciding to work for himself, his customers and jobs were interesting and various. Transporting polo ponies to Spain and Scotland was a particular highlight. The identity of one pony on board to Scotland was very hush hush, in reality probably the worst kept secret, belonging to a certain royal very keen on polo at that time. An HGV fitter is *young* mans career, so in time he worked at a van hire company and finally became an HGV inspector and tester for the DVLA.

An incidental job, or rather a favour, cropped up a couple of times when he was asked to be a wine waiter for the then Earl of Ducie. In Dick's unique style if anyone couldn't decide if they wanted white or red he told them, "When you've made up your mind let me know and I'll come back".

Around the age of 13, Dick took part in the village nativity in Tytherington where he met Sue. It was the really hard winter of 62/63 so the nativity was temporarily abandoned. Although their paths crossed a few times it was approximately 10 years later they met up again at another village function the Tytherington gymkhana dance. They married in 1978 and set up home in Brookside Cottage, Cromhall, working and developing the garden from a jungle to its present state. Dick enjoyed his garden; building and making many features as well as growing vegetables, and entering his sunflowers in Cromhall village flower and produce show, winning the sunflower cup several times. He often won the cup for two consecutive years but his ambition was to win it for three consecutive years and finally this year he succeeded. Dick would also help run the bar at the Flower Show, wearing his distinctive bowler hat and colourful braces or a waistcoat.

Besides gardening, Dick had many hobbies and interests throughout his life, jalopy racing, All Wheel Drive trials competing in his landrover and also setting up the trials, he was a member of the first British team to take part in the Baja 1000 race in Mexico as one of their mechanical support. A landrover chassis had been

sitting in the roof of Dick's garage for many, many years, intending to rebuild it, this he achieved only very recently, it is a beast of a thing to drive but he congratulated his brother Ivor in keeping out of the cycle lanes on a recent drive out. He participated in many historic vehicle road runs over the years, including the London to Brighton run for commercial vehicles, also tractor runs, he took part in earth moving demonstrations at Welland where he met and made friends with numerous people who say they loved listening to his amusing stories and anecdotes. Another hobby was wood, coppicing.

felling trees, and subsequent cutting and splitting, also helping Hugh with his racksaw at shows. Some of that wood was for the wood burner or to build their "plant palace" and green room in the garden.

Dick was also very successful at... sleeping. Sue always said he could sleep on a washing line, for example; Dick maintained a QC's landrover, and they were invited to "a bit of a do" at his house; later in the evening Dick was found fast asleep under his antique dresser. On another occasion at an event at the village hall, Dick went outside for a breath of fresh air and promptly fell asleep in the field next door, much to the amusement of the children who kept going out to check on him. Then there was the time when they were in Hong Kong, he seemed to have disappeared at the end of Boxing Day evening, after a mini search he was found fast asleep in a land drain in the courtyard. Most recently at Sue's god-daughter's wedding, he was sleeping peacefully after the speeches, which greatly amused the younger ones on their table.

They were fortunate to have many friends and relations worldwide, which enabled them to visit Hong Kong, Cyprus, several visits to The States, and New Zealand a fond favourite of Dicks. They also drove to Switzerland in a 20+ year old landrover and visited Canada with Peggy and Doug.

We're looking forward to speaking to the Chamber of Commerce in January, and hope to work in partnership with all local organisations for mutual benefit.

One such organisation is The Castle School. A meeting with the Headteacher indicates that there are fantastic opportunities for working with them, especially to help our local young people access the arts and learn about the strength of our fabulous community. This meeting confirmed how special Thornbury already is in terms of community engagement.

The building

The team is working hard on determining the necessary building work. It is essential to be compliant with regulations including those relating to improved energy efficiency. The complete focus remains on reopening the venue as soon as possible, while heeding all the professional advice we are receiving. We're also working to improve the foyer for better accessibility, as indicated by the questionnaire.

There is still juggling to be done to finalise a sound and achievable plan, but our intention is to gather all the final pieces of information and advice needed in order to complete it.

For over 60 years our Thornbury Art Club has been a place for like-minded people who love to paint together and share experiences in a friendly atmosphere.



ROCKHAMPTON PARISH COUNCIL

The last quarterly meeting took place on Monday 11th November 2024 at which Cllr Tina Mitchel Skinner took the Chair in the absence of Cllr Tom Cullimore.

During Public participation, the Secretary of the Village Hall gave a brief outline regarding the Village Hall's current financial position and the efforts the Committee were making to increase the hiring returns going forward. Later in the meeting Councillors discussed an application from the Village Hall Committee for a grant to help with its ongoing costs and future improvements where it was agreed that the Village Hall Committee be asked to provide details on its current year's budget and more detailed information on its proposals for improvements before making any final decision.

Ward Councillor Riddle confirmed that speed checks had been completed during August and September on the Lower Stone Road which reported that between 20% and 25% of traffic was within the 30-mph speed limit. A request had been made for the Speed Visor to come back for a further three weeks for more checks to be completed and that the Police had also been asked to undertake further speed monitoring.

Under Financial Matters the Council's budget for 2025/26 was agreed along with the Parish Precept, which was set at £3,850.00, an increase of £150.00 on the current financial year.

The next quarterly meeting is due to take place on **Monday 24**th **February in the Village Hall commencing at 7.30pm.**

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

A Visit to Milbury Heath

The current Dobies Garden Centre has grown out of an original horticultural business started on this junction of the Milbury Heath Road in between the two world wars. It was called The Forest and Orchard Nursery and their office was an attractive little bungalow facing the A38 where a rather less attractive modern building has recently been constructed. This road leads along to the little hamlet of Milbury Heath with its now disused Methodist Chapel dominating the landscape. Clustered around it are various houses and cottages. Until fairly recent times, there was a little general store situated here, also a sub-Post Office. The area has the appearance of a little village green which has recently been enhanced by two local residents who have created a small village pond on the site where one used to exist. These two men live in a short row of semi-detached houses which were built after the war to accommodate agricultural workers.

From this high point is a most attractive view towards the north of the parish and beyond to Stone and the River Severn. A bench has been placed here, where those who choose to, can enjoy this panorama. Although it is very small, the hamlet has a friendly and inviting aura. There is another little road to enter or exit the hamlet. It stretches just a short distance down a steep pitch from the chapel to the A38. There is also a set of stone steps which can be used to access the area from the main road. At this spot, existed, until the widening of the A38 in the 1950s, an old blacksmith's workshop. It had originally been worked by the Clark family who lived in the house perched on the top of the high ground, commanding a wonderful view over the Severn Estuary. Between this house and the chapel stands another house called 'The Kepters'. This is an old word for 'Keepers' and probably has some association anciently with the gamekeepers who would have guarded the Thornbury Estate lands in this area. It is also very close to the Tortworth Estate lands. 'The Kepters' was apparently, many years ago, an inn. Reportedly, it would appear to have features which would provide evidence to verify this. Possibly, it closed and The White Horse was built to replace it. This is not necessarily the case but it is something that frequently happened. The licence from one ale-house was granted to another close by.

The name of this lane is Chapel Lane and it connects directly across the main road with Whitewall Lane. This is a very narrow hollow way (signifying an ancient, well-used route) dropping down into Clay Lane and the general Crossways area. The other road out of the hamlet, which goes past the Dobies Garden Centre, connects across the main road with Hackett Lane which again drops down eventually to Crossways. Again, the lane appears to be a hollow way.

In centuries past, Milbury Heath and Buckover would have been rather remote communities. Life would have been bleak, physically perched upon such high ground. The fact has emerged during the compiling of this book that a tight-knit community existed here and this is probably the reason. In order to survive, the families would be inter-dependent

Before leaving the hamlet of Milbury Heath, there are two other features worthy of mention. One is the Green Lane. This lane is a no through road, but leads to official, established footpaths with stone slab stiles which are a feature of the Thornbury area. The main footpath goes through to The Hill at Tytherington. Another one goes across to the water tower near the old Abadan Garage.

The other feature near by no longer exists, but the site does. Where two modern homes are now built, originally stood two (or three?) wooden bungalows. These comprised a small isolation hospital for use in the early twentieth century. Later on, they were turned into homes, but circa 1980 they were demolished and new houses were built.

Shortly after this location, the traveller can choose to branch left, passing the top of Brinkmarsh Lane, and then continue over the motorway bridge, past Hope Farm to the beautiful wooded lanes leading to Cromhall. This area was anciently a small separate manor called Hope. The meaning of 'Hope' is, 'Valley of thieves'. One is tempted to imagine that his may refer to highwaymen or other vagabonds, who lay in wait on this remote terrain of heath and woodland to surprise and rob their victims. Sweeping up in the direction of the higher ground, one arrives at Cutts Heath and on old maps it shows that a turnpike gate existed here. There are scattered cottages, and the road links up with Baden Hill. This is another remote hamlet consisting of only a few houses. I am always tempted to think that his location holds some mystery because of its strange 'unmade' appearance. This is the outpost of Falfield Parish and the various lanes lead off steeply down into Tytherington Parish. The Falfield postman in years gone by, reportedly, walked from Falfield Post Office to Tytherington by this route. He walked there in the morning delivering on his way, collected the mail from the post boxes and made his way back in the afternoon. I remember someone once telling me, that somewhere in the location of Baden Hill there was a purpose-built little hut where he could stop for a rest and to have his refreshments.

Far away in this quiet, remote location, the central village of Falfield appears to have little relevance. The quickest way to return would be through Brinkmarsh Lane. Apparently, there was an old coach route from Tytherington, via Brinkmarsh to Whitfield. Once back down in the village, there are lanes and hamlets we have not yet explored.
