All change!!!



As we prepare for British Summer Time to come into effect on March 29th campaigners, including the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA) and environmental campaigners, continue to argue that British Summer Time should be maintained during the winter months, and that a "double summertime" be applied to the current British Summer Time period, putting the UK one hour ahead of GMT during winter, and two hours ahead during summer. This proposal is referred to as "Single/Double Summer

Time" (SDST), and would effectively mean the UK adopting the same time zone as European countries such as France, Germany, and mainland Spain (Central European Time and Central European Summer Time) but as we know, alignment between Britain and Europe is not always welcomed, nor are differences anything new.

Until September 1752 Britain had followed the Julian calendar, so called because it was first implemented by Julius Caesar in 46 BC. However, it had a flaw in its calculations which meant that by 1750 Britain and its colonies were 11 days ahead of the Gregorian calendar introduced in 1582 by Pope Gregory 13th and used by most of Europe. There had been attempts in the 16th and 17th centuries to make the change in Britain but the Church of England regarded it as a pop-ish move and so it failed.

It was a keen astronomer and a Fellow of the Royal Society, George Parker, the second Earl of Macclesfield, who along with the assistance of the astronomer royal, persuaded a reluctant government to support the passage of the 'Act for Regulating the Commencement of the Year and for Correcting the Calendar now in Use'. Although its passage into law was relatively straightforward, the implications of the change were rather more complicated.

Wednesday, September 2nd, 1752 was to be followed by Thursday the 14th and New Year's Day to move from March 25th to January 1st, as already was the case in Scotland. Allegedly the City of London flatly refused to pay taxes early, so the financial year was altered to start on April 6th, and still does, although this explanation is open to debate.

The changes affected festivals, feast days and birthdays as well as the dates of payments of wages, rents and interest, contracts for delivery of goods, military discharges and prison releases. It was all carefully explained in the media of the day under the slogan 'The New Style the True Style'.



Some people deplored the change on religious grounds, disapproved of British ways being altered to conform with those of foreigners, or simply thought that eleven days had been taken out of their lives. It has been claimed that mobs gathered to bawl 'Give us back our eleven days', there were riots in some places and quite a few country people insisted on observing Old Christmas Day on January 5th.

Any of this seem familiar?

If you are going into or in hospital... You can help to make sure that the church team can respond as you would like us to when you are ill.

It's important that if you are admitted to hospital, you do three things:-

- Make sure someone tells one of the ministry team that you are going into hospital – ask them to pass on the message as appropriate.
- Make it plain to the hospital staff whether (or not!) you would like a visit. This means that when someone rings up, they won't have to spend time saying 'hang on, 'I'll just ask him/her...'
- 3. Make it plain what sort of visit you would like: would you prefer a friend from the church or one of the visiting team or would you particularly like a clergy visit? If you want to be certain of a private, one to one chat, don't be afraid to ask the hospital staff if they will allow your minister to come outside normal visiting hours, so that they don't take up precious time and space from your family.



TYTHERINGTON WI – January

This year Tytherington WI celebrates its centenary in company with a number of other WIs within the Mumbleys Hill Group. It seems that in the 1920s, just five years after the WI was established in Britain, the ladies of Gloucestershire were very keen to support this amazing organisation and indeed still do, as ongoing local centenary celebrations prove. We are very proud that our WI has survived for so long though sadly our headcount is now very low and we desperately need more members if we are to continue in the long term.

Our first meeting of 2020 was well attended by our regular members who were happy to register for this coming year.

Mrs Valerie Niblett confirmed that she has arranged a coach trip to Wisley on June 11th and urged members to sign up quickly as the trip will be open to everyone. (For details see page 4.)

On completion of the usual business, we were pleased to present our annual Competition Cup to Mrs Sheila Jones with joint second positions going to Mrs Isobel Clutterbuck and Mrs Janice Cornock.

We then welcomed Mr Andrew Mildren talking about 'Heaven on Lundy". Accompanied by slides, he presented a fascinating insight into life on Lundy Island, both human and wild. This small island in the Bristol Channel certainly deserves a visit and many of us agreed, weather permitting, it would be a very worthwhile experience.

Lorna Day 1922 – 2019

Despite living in Thornbury for almost forty years, Lorna was very much a part of the Cromhall community for most of her married life. Born in Leeds, she grew up in Yorkshire and left school just as war loomed on the horizon. She joined the WRAF and became a radar operator, coming south to Gloucester for her training before being posted to Islay where she eventually met her husband, Charles, a fellow radar operator who was a printer in civilian life. They married in 1944 and after demobilisation, Charles found himself working with the prison service at the new open prison at Leyhill, teaching printing. Staff accommodation was provided and Lorna soon became involved in village life.

Lorna had a wide variety of interests, including cycling and camping which she shared with her husband and two sons, Tony and Clive. She ran the Cub Pack in Cromhall for several years with Mrs Golding. Peggy Collett, who was helping to run the Tytherington Cub Pack at the time, remembers meeting Lorna about 1961 when the two packs went on a joint holiday in Dorset and the leaders got to know one another well. Later Peggy and Lorna would work together to run the Cromhall Pack for a short while.

As an active member of St Andrew's Church, Lorna belonged to the Mothers' Union and was treasurer of the Cromhall branch when Ann Greenhalgh first met her in 1985 In 1992 Lorna became branch leader, organizing speakers for meetings and attending diocesan MU meetings; she was dedicated to the work of the organisation and remained as branch leader until 2006, after which she continued to be involved as much as possible, hosting the Wave of Prayer in 2007 at her home.

Lorna was a practical person who liked to keep busy. She enjoyed sewing, knitting, quilling; her handmade cards are fondly remembered and she was a very good dressmaker. However, she had a more reflective side to her character and enjoyed writing poetry. She was also keen to explore her faith and Mandy Bird remembers meeting her in the late 90s at a Bible discussion group where she soon learned that Lorna had a strong and unshakeable faith and a desire to know as much about the Bible as possible. Over several months the group focussed on St Paul's letters and there were often lively and in-depth debates - Lorna took no prisoners!

It wasn't until after her husband's death that Lorna learned to drive, first of all using a scooter and then a Robin Reliant, which became her trademark – it gave her independence but apparently the boys say she was a terrible driver! When Lorna's faithful old Reliant Robin could no longer be patched up and nursed through the MOT, she said she would have to stop coming to St Andrew's but knowing how much St Andrew's meant to her and what an important part of her life the church was, Mandy and John Bird ferried her to and from Thornbury until sadly the osteo-arthritis prevented even this. Loss of hearing led to communication being difficult and gradually she became more housebound.

Lorna is remembered by those who knew her as strong willed, resilient, and stoical, yet kind, thoughtful and loving; qualities we would all like to be remembered for.

A mission to provide **Hospital Heroes**

On 8th March at St Leonard's, Tortworth, we shall be remembering those around the world who suffer from leprosy. This is not a disease which died out in the Middle Ages or was confined to biblical times, but one which still exists today and is to be found mainly in areas of extreme poverty.

The focus this year is on 'Hospital Heroes'. Like those being treated in our own hospitals, people affected by leprosy also need heroes. They often live in extremely poor conditions and have very limited access to medical care. Patients are often rejected by their communities, including their families; they face suffering alone because of stigma which the disease carries. In such situations suicide can sometimes feel like the only option.

The staff working for The Leprosy Mission cure and treat thousands of people each year, providing unconditional love and skilled medical care at specialist leprosy hospitals. They work long hours because resources are so scarce. Because they have a religious commitment to their work, they work for a fraction of the salaries their clinical training enables them to earn.

Dr Saw is one such hero who works at a leprosy hospital in Myanmar. He chooses to live



alongside his patients as well as performing surgery and providing first-class medical care and on one occasion he trekked for two days to reach a leprosy patient needing urgent treatment in a remote part of the country. He is not alone in going beyond the call of duty; from diagnosing leprosy and giving the cure to providing surgery, physiotherapy and counselling to those who feel rejection and discrimination, the team helps people who otherwise have no support.

In 2017, 1,295 new cases of leprosy were diagnosed in India, 8,615 members joined local Civil Society Organisations and 1,468 individuals were given vocational training.


Aust Parish Council covers the three villages of Aust, Littleton-upon-Severn and Elberton with an electoral roll of about 420.

Falfield Parish Council

The highlights of the last Parish Council meeting held on 18th February were as follows:

- A member of the public voiced their concern over the loss of the grass verge outside the Village Hall due to heavy goods vehicles and farm vehicles mounting the kerb running over the grass resulting in a wide rut appearing. Councillors agreed that the Parish Council should write to the Local Avon and Somerset Beat Team to bring this to their attention with a view of taking steps to prosecute drivers who drive over the verge which is an offence. At the same time the Parish Council would write to South Gloucestershire Council to request that they also inspect this issue with a view to installing bollards to stop this being repeated.
- In his report to the meeting Ward Councillor O'Neill confirmed that South Gloucestershire Council had withdrawn the Joint Spatial Plan and that it would be replaced by a new Local Plan. He informed the meeting that this plan is expected to take between two and four years before it was adopted.
- Work had now started on the replacement of the two-inch water main along a section of the A38 and at the top of Sundayshill Lane. This work was expected to be completed by 4th May. Also, Western Power Distribution will be installing a new mains cable to the Falfield Grange development in Sundayshill Lane commencing on 9th March for three weeks. This will result in the road being closed for approx. 3 days between 16th and 18th March.

Colin Arthur Smith

1933 – 2020



The sound of the hunting horn playing 'Gone Away' was a fitting end to the service of thanksgiving for the life of Colin Smith at St George's Church, Falfield, for hunting had played a key part in Colin's life from an early age when he and his friends from Rockhampton school had played Fox and Hounds, jumping the rhines as part of the 'chase', to his participation in the Countryside March in 1997 as a member of the Berkeley Hunt Supporters Club and the Countryside Alliance.

Growing up at Oakhall Farm, Sundayshill, where the family had farmed since 1900, surrounded by fields and beautiful countryside, Colin loved the natural world around him and enjoyed walking and working in it throughout his life; he also loved poetry which reflected this.

Before transferring to school in Thornbury at the age of eleven, along

with his younger brother, Graham, Colin attended Rockhampton school where his fellow scholars became lifetime friends. He played cricket there and became involved with other village activities such as the annual Guy Fawkes Night bonfire on the village green, which became wellknown in the vicinity as one of the highlights of village life.

In 1951 Colin was called up for National Service, serving with the 5th Gloucestershire Regiment. Following basic training, he was based at Warminster but narrowly missed going to war in Korea; however, he took part in the funeral parade for King George VI and was on duty, lining the streets of London, for Queen's coronation in 1953.

On completion of his National Service, Colin returned to Sundayshill and in 1957 married Lucy from the cottage across the lane, with whom he had grown up. Together they had two children: Pat and Steve.

Initially working for Mr Pullin at Pennywell Farm, Rockhampton, Colin then went on to work at Sunday's Hill Farm for Brigadier Treseder before going to work for the Lower Severn Internal Drainage Board. His new job took him the entire stretch of the Berkeley Vale, monitoring and improving rhines, streams and ditches, in fact any waterways that drained the land of the water running down from the hills, providing it with unhindered channelling into the River Severn. This was an interesting occupation which Colin continued until his retirement, despite having suffered a heart attack in 1993.

Colin was a countryman through and through; he loved being outdoors, whether in his garden or walking and studying the landscape. One of Colin's many contributions to village life in Falfield was the Boxing Day and May Day walks which he planned, organised and led for several years. Trees were another of his passions – referring to them by their Latin names and planting many in the locality. He also walked for miles around the village delivering copies of 5 Alive until ill health prevented him from doing so.

In the mid-1980's Colin and Lucy took over maintaining the churchyard, taking care to keep areas for wildflowers to grow and encouraging insects to flourish. He also supported Lucy in her work as caretaker at the village hall and when the church had a flagpole installed, he became responsible for ensuring the flag was hoisted for Sundays and commemorative occasions. Having become a regular church attender in later life, Colin was baptised and confirmed at the age of 81. He also became a member of the Parochial Church Council.

Colin's valuable contribution and dedication as a volunteer within the South Glos community was recognised in 2006 when he was given the South Gloucestershire Chair's Community Award.

Colin will be remembered as someone who was gentle and kind; he had cared for Lucy at the end of her life and the family speak of him as being an unassuming and loving father. He will be missed in many ways and we offer our sympathy to Pat, Steve and their families in their loss.


