People to forgive us for those times we say or do things wrong – because let's face it we all do that and most of us do it quite unwittingly! Thank you for being 'people' to and for me.

Ministry for me has never been a job, I really believe it is a privilege, a way of life — even in those times when I've been saying to God "What is going on here?" or, more often.... "You want me to do what?". I have always been aware that you were not allowed to 'choose' me as your priest and so I'm very grateful for those of you who have been willing to support and share with me in ministry here and for the laughter we have been able to share too. I may pop up now and again as a visitor but my thoughts and prayers will continue for you — you will, as with all my previous parishes, continue to be 'my' people, just in a different way.

Five Alive – The Future of the Newsletter

As a reader of 5 Alive you may have noticed in the last two issues that the cost of producing a 16 page is now £495 per month. This covers the printing of 1,250 copies per month allowing us to meet our target of delivering the newsletter to each property in the 5 parishes. Unfortunately, this has presented the 5 Alive team with a financial headache that needs to be resolved if the future of the newsletter is to be assured.

Firstly, let me give you a few figures (the boring statistics). A quick calculation shows that the annual production cost is £5,940 representing an annual cost per household of approximately £5. The production cost is covered by funding from donations and advertising. Because of Covid-19 and the pandemic our most reliable recent figures for these funds comes from 2019. Donations were £1,600 and advertising generated £3,151. This shows that there is currently a shortfall of £1200 per year – a situation that we cannot allow to continue.

There are a few options that we can consider and you, our readers, may think of other ones. These options are:

- Do nothing. This means that in 2 years we would have to stop production of a paper copy of the newsletter and only produce an online version.
- Increase the advertising costs. Currently, the highest price is £56 per month for a full page advert with reduced prices for half, quarter or eighth page adverts. To meet the shortfall this way would mean an eye watering increase of 38% equivalent to £78 per issue. We could stagger the increase over a number of years, say 8% per year over 5 years.
- Reduce the number of printed pages. The April issue was just 12 pages which cost £330 to print. However, we will need to maintain the adverts per issue that have been paid for, thus reducing the number of pages related to articles of interest.
- Reduce the number of issues from 12 per year. A reduction to 6 issues would halve the cost of production and mean that the newsletter can continue.

There are likely to be other options that you the reader may like to suggest for example are you aware of any organisation willing to make an annual donation. You can send me your opinions at crosthwaitega@outlook.com.

I recognise that increasing inflation is having an impact on everybody and I am not requesting anybody makes a donation they cannot afford. I am therefore not seeking additional donations unless you can afford them.



Falfield Parish Council

At their meeting on Tuesday 19th April 2022 Councillors discussed a number of highways issues which had previously been raised with StreetCare. Councillor Fryer stated that at the recent Community Engagement Forum he attended, at which the Head of Street-Care and Transport was also present, he confirmed their highways budget for the current fiscal year was 4 million pounds, which fell short of what was required. During his report Ward Councillor O'Neill indicated that as a short-term solution to cope with increasing traffic National Highways were considering the installation of four lanes on the B4509 running over the M5 at junction 14. The longterm solution would be a two-bridge roundabout

The Clerk reported that the Falfield Grange Development Liaison Group had not met since before Christmas 2021 following the departure of the Site Manager and that although several requests had been made to Linden Homes for a meeting no offer of any dates had been forthcoming. Councillor O'Neill agreed to contact Linden Homes requesting that Liaison Group meetings resume as soon as possible.

Two planning applications were on the agenda which Councillors discussed and raised no objection. They also noted two planning approvals that had been received since their previous meeting.

Councillors also gave their approval to the Falfield & Stone Brownies for use of the Village Green on two occasions during June and July, and St George's Parochial Church Council for their Platinum Jubilee celebrations event on 5th June.

The meeting closed at 9.15pm

The next Council meeting will be the **Annual Parish Council** meeting on **Tuesday 17**th **May** which will follow the Annual Parish meeting which commences at 7pm in the Village Hall.



Falfield WI Report

As it was Members' Night, Guilda Ludwell stood in for our presi-

dent, Gill Spiller, and welcomed two new members to our WI.

The speaker for the evening was Steve Loader, Honorary Chaplain to seafarers at Portbury Dock, Avonmouth, where he supports the crews of ships which dock there – a post he has held since 2006. As well as offering support to the men, Steve gives out essential items such as SIM cards and warm clothes. Crews are often away from their families for months at a time and need to call home; they may also have left port in a hot climate and do not have suitable clothing for colder weather conditions. Other items which they appreciate are chocolate, Wi-fi, routers, jigsaws, toiletries, knitted scarves, neck-warmers and hats, which they call 'bonnets', some of which have been made by the WI. On one occasion he also treated 21 crew members to Big Mac burgers. Covid was especially difficult for seafarers as they were not allowed off the ship for fourteen months.

During the course of the talk, we learned that Avonmouth has the second largest lock gates in Europe and that one of the car transporter ships carries a load of 8,000 cars!

Our next meeting is on 3rd May at 7.30pm when there will be a Bring and Buy stall. The speaker will be Alan Freke on The History of Frenchay Hospital. A walk has been arranged for 4th May and details are available from our secretary, Ann Mair.

Elderflower 'champagne'

Three-in-10 drivers so worried about narrow country lanes they deliberately avoid them

According to a survey by car insurers and the RAC, three-in-10 motorists admit to deliberately steering clear of narrow country lanes and are prepared to take a detour of 16 miles or 25 minutes to avoid them.

As millions of Brits jump into their cars and head off on UK holidays in the countryside this summer, the figures highlight just how unnerved many drivers – especially those who live in towns and cities – are by Britain's rural roads, which account for more than half of all those in the country.

More than half of drivers (58%) say they find using narrow country roads stressful, a figure that rises to 76% for drivers who live in urban areas.

The two biggest causes of stress, according to the research, are the difficulty of squeezing past other vehicles in tight spaces (62%) and the fear of colliding with another vehicle head on (61%).

But the etiquette of who moves out of the way is also high on drivers' list of concerns about these types of roads. Having to try to reverse back to find a passing place (45%), the fear of meeting a tractor and not being able to pass (44%) and deciding who succumbs to back up to a passing place (37%) make up drivers' top five stress factors.

More than a third (36%) meanwhile say they think the default 60mph limit on country roads is just too fast to begin with, while 35% say they fear damaging their car.

Many of us who live in the country could have guessed this without a survey!! Perhaps it's time for driving in the country to be included in standard driving tests?



LIVE PERFORMANCES TO RETURN FOR MINI THORNBURY ARTS FESTIVAL

Despite the cancellation of the Thornbury Arts Festival in 2020 & 2022, there was a determination on the part of the organisers to plan something for the town and surrounding area in 2022, so a mini-event will take place between Thursday 23rd

and Saturday 25th June this year. It is hoped that this will pave the way for a full programme of music, comedy, drama and talks next Spring.

Closure of the town's Armstrong Hall (the event's traditional venue) has added to the difficulties faced by organisers but three venues will be used this year:

- St Mary's Church, Thornbury, hosts the opening night a costumed portrayal by Lesley Smith of Anne Boleyn in the Tower of London in the final minutes of her life. Lesley is the curator of Tutbury Castle in Staffordshire, as well as a medical historian. She has appeared in more than 120 TV programmes and is known for her entertaining and informative performances of historical characters.
 - This will be an appropriate venue for the show as it stands next to Thornbury Castle, where Anne Boleyn stayed with Henry VIII in 1535 after becoming his second wife.
- The Castle School, Thornbury, is the venue for a popular return to the festival on the Friday by Stringfever four musicians who combine their musical skill on electric instruments with beatbox, humour and showmanship. As members of the same family, the players mix classical favourites with rock classics and movie themes and were a hit with their audience when they last appeared at the festival in 2017.
- Tytherington Village Hall is the venue for the Cate Cody Quintet who had been set to perform at the 2020 event and will bring the festival to a close on Saturday 25th June. Cate is one of the UK's finest jazz singers, with appearances at the BAFTA Television Awards, for Earl Spencer at Althorp and at the Emirates Stadium, as well as performing at sell-out concerts at jazz festivals and dance events. Her musicians are professionals from the top ranks of British jazz, having worked with the likes of Acker Bilk, George Melly, Georgie Fame, Kenny Ball, Imelda May and Clare Teal. Cate specialises in the Great American Songbook from the 1920s to 1940s and will be performing a selection of favourites.


Thornbury Arts Festival normally runs across nine days each spring and the team behind the event hope to get back to normal next year.

The festival committee said: "We're really pleased to have been able to put together this programme, albeit a shortened form of the festival, and look forward to welcoming audiences once again."

Meanwhile, the festival's popular guided walk has been moved to Sunday, September 18th, with two groups to be taken around "hidden Chepstow", ending with a visit to the Severn Princess ferry, which used to cross the river before the Severn Bridge opened in 1966.

Falfield Cricket Club

According to Ken Coughlin's book 'A Century in the Vale'*, Falfield's newly formed cricket club began its season on May 15th 1920 with a match at home to North Nibley. They won their match with a total of 75 against North Nibley's 26. Amongst the players were some Tortworth men whose team had yet to reform after the Great War.

However, it appears that Falfield already had a team based at Eastwood Park in 1905 and possibly earlier, no doubt consisting mainly of those who worked on the estate which at that time was owned by Sir George Jenkinson. The Great War resulted in a change of ownership of the estate and no doubt the disruption led to the end of that particular team.

The matches played in the 1920s show that most of the local villages had their own teams: Cromhall, Tytherington, Wickwar, Wotton and Oldbury, Alveston, Thornbury – even the Forest & Orchard Nurseries (a precursor of Dobies) all featured in fixtures against Falfield. By 1931 however, Falfield seems to have disappeared from the cricketing scene once again. Perhaps this was because yet more disruption was taking place at Eastwood as it moved into the ownership of the government and became a training venue in preparation for World War II.

By 1947, when life began to settle down once more, moves were made to resurrect the cricket club in Falfield. Their first match was away to Charfield in the 1948 season, which resulted in a resounding defeat. In our first season we had no pavilion, no running water and no toilet facilities – only a good selection of nearby trees. Teas at home matches were provided by a mobile refreshment van, and a very successful season, socially, was enjoyed by all. Results on the field were not so encouraging but performances improved, together with support, and arrangements were made for another season.

Eventually a pavilion was located and erected in the park, where the old cricket pitch had been identified and was once again in use. Catering could now be done 'in house', thanks to the efforts of the ladies! A suitable roller to maintain the pitch was located at Chestnut Farm, about half-way to Stone; it was free of charge for the summer but had to be collected and returned at the end of the season. Consequently, twice a year, a group of members walked to the farm on a spring evening, and pushed the roller to the pitch, thus working up a thirst – very convenient with the Huntsman's House Inn adjacent – and repeating the process in the early autumn. Of course, all this was before the advent of league cricket, and players were restricted, in the early days, to being locals, - enthusiasm being considered far more important than ability. However, as people moved away or changed employment, the club had to rethink, and then had members from a larger catchment area, but still managed to retain the village identity. Falfield survived until the middle to late 1970s, when it moved to Tytherington, where the playing fields offered far better facilities than Falfield offered, and paved the way for application to, and acceptance by, the Bristol and District League when Falfield was eventually subsumed into Tytherington and lost its identity.
