Where civilisation begins



I have just come back from a small Pembrokeshire bay, where I had plenty of time to just sit and ponder the wonders of our beautiful world.

I tried to imagine how the slate miners who lived in the cottage I was staying in, survived without the amenities we take for granted. I watched the eternal movement of the sun, the moon and the tides and the annual arrival of the seals and their pups and I was very conscious of being a very small speck in this immense ever evolving world.

Then quite out of the blue and somewhat out of character, a friend sent me this:

Years ago, anthropologist Margaret Mead was asked by a student what she considered to be the first sign of civilization in a culture. The student expected Mead to talk about fishhooks or clay pots or grinding stones. But no. Mead said that the first sign of civilization in an ancient culture was a femur (thighbone) that had been broken and then healed.

Mead explained that in the animal kingdom, if you break your leg, you die. You cannot run from danger, get to the river for a drink or hunt for food. You are meat for prowling beasts. No animal survives a broken leg long enough for the bone to heal.

A broken femur that has healed is evidence that someone has taken time to stay with the one who fell, has bound up the wound, has carried the person to safety and has tended the person through recovery. Helping someone else through difficulty is where civilization starts.

Mead said, "We are at our best when we serve others. Be civilized."

ROCKHAMPTON FOLK & World Music

Applications now open for Rockhampton Folk Festival Grants

Making a difference to our community is at the heart of Rockhampton Folk Festival. When we set up the festival one of our dreams was that it could pro-

mote and support local music-making. We started this with our programme of outreach to schools and care homes which is growing every year.

We're now taking the next step and offering our first Rockhampton Folk Festival Grants. We will consider applications from individuals who want to develop their own music-making or from organisations, educational institutions, charities and groups who share our aim of supporting and developing music-making in our community.

Grants could support specific projects, be for music tuition or education, the purchase of equipment, enhancing venues etc. We don't have any preconceived ideas so be imaginative!

We will prioritise funding for projects, people and organisations that deliver in the areas surrounding Rockhampton.

CRiSP

November sees the first anniversary of the formation of CRiSP - Cromhall Road Safety Project. The group was formed after local residents expressed their concern at the speed and volume of traffic along the main road through the village.

In the last year the group has made progress, but there's still plenty of work to do. Our achievements so far include:

- Setting up a Community Speedwatch programme where local volunteers will monitor vehicle speeds and report offenders to authorities.
- Securing a very generous £10k donation from Breedon Quarry to contribute toward fixed ANPR (automatic number plate recognition) cameras.
- Opening dialogue with local firms who's travel routes run through the village, highlighting the impact their vehicles have on the community.
- Communicating with authorities to ensure road signage is of the correct standard. This means that enforcement from Avon and Somerset Police has restarted recently.
- Conducting surveys into the speeds of vehicles through the village.

The recent surveys found that **just 19%** of cars passing through the village were driving at the 30mph speed limit. On one date in April, the average speed was 36mph - a massive **20% over the speed limit**.

HGVs were found to be offenders too - during one survey **less than 4%** of HGVs travelling through the village were going at 30mph or less. The average speed was **38mph - 27% over the speed limit**.

Over the next year, we hope to get the Community Speedwatch started, conduct a survey of footpaths through the village, continue to monitor speeds of vehicles and get the cameras operational.

HMP EASTWOOD PARK – PROPOSAL FOR NEW FACILITIES

As part of the Government's commitment to deliver 20,000 prison places across England and Wales by the mid-2020s, HMP Eastwood Park has been identified as a site for development. The prison, situated in Falfield Parish, is a women only closed prison with a population of 350 (Sept 2022).

The Ministry of Justice has developed plans for 127 new accommodation places, 75 of which will be new open accommodation.

Parish Councillors were invited to the prison on 28 September to have a tour of the site and discuss the developments. The Ministry of Justice subsequently wrote to local residents informing them of the developments and inviting them to a drop-in session on Saturday 12th November 2022 from 10am- 4pm at HMP Eastwood Park Training Unit, Church Avenue, GL12 8DB (external to the prison). This invitation is extended to all members of the public, to meet with officials from the Ministry of Justice, the prison, and planning consultants to talk through the proposals and answer any questions you may have.

Details of these plans will be publicly available as part of the planning process. Planning application was due to be submitted by 28 October. Following registration, the Local Planning Authority (South Gloucester-shire Council) will notify local residents that the application has been registered and invite comments on the planning application. All comments will be taken into account.

Why is the prison estate expanding? The programme is in response to a rising prison population, which is forecast to grow significantly during the 2020s.

In addition to this need for new prison places, there is currently a demonstrable and urgent need for open provision within the Women's prison estate.

If women are not held in the right prison at the right time, it may make it harder for them to access appropriate services, treatment or offending behavioural work. This will make it more difficult for them to manage and reduce their risks and in turn, this will make it harder for them to rehabilitate and resettle on their eventual release from custody.

New open provision will provide an incentive for women to progress within their establishment without the need to move further from their families and support networks and the upheaval that goes with that. Evidence has shown that improved stability and access to support networks has a positive impact on the reduction of self-harm – a known issue in the women's estate.

What does 'open' accommodation mean? This is not a change in the security category of the prison but will be an extension of HMP Eastwood Park's existing scope under which women in closed conditions are already eligible (subject to certain criteria and robust risk assessment) to be working in the community daily on a licence. These new facilities will support an effective rehabilitation bridge for them between custody and their eventual return to the community.

Women who live in the new open accommodation, situated outside the secure fence line, but within a domestic fence line, will only do so having been subject to a rigorous and robust risk assessment. They will be allowed to leave the site under strict conditions and for a purposeful reason, usually to visit a place of work or education. The open unit will have restricted access and those entering or exiting will be signed in and out.

There is a strong track record of improved resettlement outcomes for women who can access open conditions, with this being recognised by the Inspectorate of Prisons and the Independent Monitoring Board. Examples of pre-existing multi-functional sites include women's prisons, HMP Drake Hall and HMP Styal. Both closed prisons run open facilities outside of the secure fence line and report positive outcomes in terms of continuation of care and the opportunities this presents to support women in preparing for their eventual release with improved outcomes for rehabilitation.

Cromhall Parish Council

Proposed Development next to Chapel: At the end of August, the council held an extraordinary parish council meeting, to discuss a planning application to build 32 new homes in the field next to the chapel. The developer (Cotswold Homes) presented their proposal and residents had an opportunity to ask questions and raise concerns. Overall, the public indicated a unanimous objection to the proposal. After considering the application, the parish council also submitted its comprehensive objection to the proposal to South Gloucestershire Council. Thank you to everyone who attended.

Defibrillators: Cromhall now has 2 defibrillators available in the village. Over the summer the parish council supplied and installed a defibrillator on the De Smit building (the old mushroom farm). The Chapel has also recently installed a defibrillator on the outside of their building and the parish council is planning to arrange some training sessions for people in the village to learn more about using a defibrillator. More news on this soon.

Townwell Play Area: The parish council has recently had to replace one of the pieces of play equipment. Following the annual inspection, it also arranged repairs and maintenance to the wet-pour surfacing, raised the basket swing and repaired the drain covers. The park is looking really good, and it is good to know that it is regularly in use.

Please note as the signage suggests that dogs are not permitted in the play area and there should be no ball games. The park is in a residential area and is quite small so these requests are to ensure that everyone can enjoy their visit to the park and to protect the neighbouring fences from damage.

New parish council notice board: At the Annual Parish meeting, one issue raised was that people at the Cromhall Common end of the village did not have a parish council notice board and needed to visit Townwell Play area to find information. To rectify this, the council has now installed a new notice board in the bus stop on the main road near Cowship Lane. In future, minutes and agendas will be posted in both notice boards.

The October meeting was the first at the Village Hall since June. September's meeting was cancelled as it coincided with the Queen's funeral but Tytherington members have been meeting regularly throughout the intervening period with a variety of outings and events.

We were interested to learn that the hospice supports people over a huge area from South Gloucestershire to North Somerset, many of whom have a number of 'life limiting' conditions e.g. Cancer, Lung, Heart and Neurological disorders.

Fundraising is an essential part of hospice activities because whilst hospice care is free of charge, it costs £26k per day to provide that care. Government contributes £6k per day, leaving £20k per day to find. The loss of fundraising during the pandemic had a devastating effect and financial recovery is slow. Volunteers are also an essential part of the operation as they offer care and support in all aspects, from the general running of the hospice to supporting families and patients, both at home and on site.

We thanked Ann for her time and agreed to do all we can to support this amazing organisation. She then kindly judged our 'animal ornament' competition: 1st Valerie Vizard, 2nd Sheila Jones, 3rd Rosa Taylor. Our next meeting is scheduled for Monday November 21st at 2pm in the Village Hall.
