



Armstrong Hall Joint Statement 1/10/2024

The Armstrong Hall Trust and Thornbury Community and Arts (TCA) are pleased to announce a speedy and constructive start to the process of investigating the reopening of the Armstrong Hall Complex in Chapel Street.

The Armstrong Hall was closed during the Covid lockdown in 2020. Being already in need of a costly upgrade, it has remained shut since then.

The Armstrong Hall Trust undertook an appraisal of options to reintroduce a performance facility to the

town. When a generous donor offered money which would enable restorative work to commence on the Armstrong Hall, the Trust decided to work with the Thornbury Community and Arts (TCA) Community Interest Company to progress the refurbishment project, and also the operation of the facility once restored.

The Trust now has a working group of delegates who will ensure that plans for the Complex are fully compliant with all current safety regulations, while supporting TCA to achieve these standards.

In the meantime, TCA is establishing an appropriate organisational structure to manage the planning not only of the short-term building restoration, but also the reopening and operation of the community-led business which will run it for the benefit of the town and surrounding area.

During this initial investigation and planning stage, it won't be possible to predict a date for the reopening, as it will depend largely on the work which needs to be done on the buildings. A building surveyor has already paid a first visit, and they will propose a process for undertaking a full inspection.

Charity to provide free Pension Credit advice sessions as Winter Fuel Payment rules change

Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire will provide a series of drop-in sessions around Pension Credit. It follows the news Winter Fuel Payments will only be made to those receiving Pension Credit or other means-tested benefits. The three sessions will be held at the charity's office in Kennedy Way, Yate, BS37 4DQ

Pensioners who are concerned about the changes to the Winter Fuel Payment will be able to attend free advice sessions on Pension Credit. Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire is responding to increased interest from the public around Pension Credit by offering three drop-in sessions.

These will allow anyone who is struggling and worried about losing the Winter Fuel Payment the opportunity to speak to a trained Adviser about Pension Credit.

Pension Credit is a benefit for pensioners on a low income, which brings their weekly income up to a minimum amount. Receiving Pension Credit also unlocks the Winter Fuel Payment – which is now available only to pensioners on means-tested benefits.

The payment is usually worth £200 to £300 and from 1997 to this year was universal – meaning it was made to all pensioners with some exceptions. But the Government has now changed the rules as part of efforts to cut the deficit.

Pension Credit is under-claimed nationally. The Policy In Practice organisation estimates there was £2.2 billion worth of Pension Credit unclaimed across Britain last year. It estimates there were 2,188 missed Pension Credit claims in South Gloucestershire alone - worth £5.2 million.

Citizens Advice South Gloucestershire has seen a 65% increase in enquiries about Pension Credit since the announcement of changes to the Winter Fuel Payment compared to the same period last year.

The charity wants to give pensioners all the help they need to access Pension Credit and the Winter Fuel Payment if they are eligible.

Have you lived in Cromhall for more than 5 years and are over 65 years old? If so then you need to read on......

From Cromhall Allotment Charity...... "Why don't I get the Allotment vouchers at Christmas?" ... a question I'm sure a few Cromhall residents think or may be asked by a neighbour. The answer is simple - the charity is just not aware of you.

Another opinion often heard voiced on receipt of the gift is "that's very nice, but I don't need it, give it to someone else" or "I don't need charity" and refuse to accept it. Of course, you can refuse it but have you thought about helping others, organizations or individuals, by using the vouchers and giving them the goods? (Please do not give your vouchers to someone else to use as they are issued in your name.)

To explain further.... the "Cromhall Poors Allotment Charity" to give it its full name (Reg. No. 204061) was set up in 1973 as an amalgamation of a few small charities and, like the previous charities, its purpose is to give "relief to the poor". This can be anyone in the parish of Cromhall, no matter what age, who is in need of assistance. The limited income for the charity comes from rents received from land it owns and it is this annual income which funds the mandate.

Anyone could apply to the charity for assistance, perhaps a young apprentice having difficulty funding nec-essary tools, or families struggling to buy school uniforms for children. Applications like these, or any other situation of hardship, would always be considered.

But individual requests rarely occur and the trustees have, for some years now, resolved to distribute the income in the form of vouchers to be used in the village shop. The trustees annually agree the amount, which could fluctuate up or down, and have agreed that this is to go to all who have lived in the village for 5 years or more, aged 65 or over (man or woman) and with one gift per household. It is extremely difficult to know who is eligible or not for the gift, so if you feel you are missing out please do make yourself known. With the current data protection regulations, your consent is required for the charity to have your name on the list it holds to administer general vouchers. The village shop has application/consent forms, please ask for one at the counter and return the completed form to the shop or directly to me.

Lastly, if you are struggling and would like to make a specific request for help, please contact me or put your request in writing to the charity giving as much information as possible. The trustees will be happy to consider any request.

On the Border

Back in August I received an email from a lady who was investigating her family's roots in this part of the country. Her great, great grandmother had lived in Falfield for the last ten years of her life and she contacted me to see if I knew where her home, Rose Cottage, had been situated. Indeed I did know where Rose Cottage was and still is.

Rose Cottage stands at the northern end of the village, firmly facing Falfield with its back to Stone. Despite looking to many people as though it might be the perfect location for the natural division between the two villages, this is not so, and the first few houses which look as though they are in Stone, are actually in Falfield.

The stretch of open road going north from Green Farm, is known locally as The Holloway. Whether this name developed to describe the actual area is difficult to ascertain but it does seem possible that before the A38 was widened to the degree it is now, this could well have been a hollow way. Several of those who lived in the village in times past have related how, as children, they felt frightened when travelling along this stretch of road. Apparently the banks were high (suggesting a holloway) with trees growing on top. This understandably made the road dark and one person likened it to going through a tunnel. (A family named Holloway owned properties here in the early 1800s which might also have given rise to the name.)

Several of the houses in this area are of interest, one of them being Brand Oak, which in the first part of the twentieth century belonged to the Fowler family who were the Stone village bakers. They had originally had their business premises at the Old Post Office Cottage at the end of the churchyard wall. (now the site of newly built houses).

In the course of time, one of the Fowler family married Mervyn Malpass, a local builder, who purchased the house; they continued to live there, raising their three children, one of whom, Muriel, was a friend of my sister. She had realised through their conversations that it was a sizeable property as Muriel related what fun it was playing such games as hide and seek because the house had a front and a rear staircase. The word 'servants' sprang to mind which denoted an owner of wealth. My sister knew that there was a large orchard at the rear of the house and gradually over the years, gained the knowledge that there was a small field across the main road, opposite the house, also named 'Brand Oak'. In addition, our father said that this field had some connection with the rector of Tortworth. Eventually, Ann discovered that the rector was entitled to graze his pony there in exchange for Falfield parishioners being allowed to bury their dead in Tortworth churchyard. Prior to Falfield becoming an independent parish in the early 1860s, Tortworth was quicker and possibly easier to access than Thornbury and according to Tortworth church records, a number of Falfield villagers worshipped at Tortworth.

On one occasion when Ann had been to talk to Mr Malpass, he made a comment about the fact that Brand Oak had once been the manse (home of a non-conformist minister) but had no idea who the minister was who might have occupied it.

The house standing next door to Brand Oak, situated up the slight incline towards the layby is now apparently called 'Brand Oak Cottage'. In the 1950s it was an L-shaped property divided into two homes. One of our childhood friends once told Ann that her grandfather had told her that the property had once been a pub called 'The Flea and the Flat Iron'. Little more could be discovered about this property until one day Ann was listening to a Radio Gloucestershire programme coming from Wickwar Brewery where the the man from the brewery (Ray Penny) was telling the presenter that the brewery's best seller, 'BOB' had been named from the initial letters of Brand Oak Beer. Mr Penny, apparently lived at one time at Brand Oak Cottage. When looking to name the new brew, the name of his home was used, - very aptly! Following a telephone conversation with him, he informed her of an arched cellar at the premises. He also told her that the owners of 'Brand Oak' (the house) believed that it had once been a coaching inn. So, as is often the case, she found some answers but also many more questions.

The frequency of inns in bygone days along what is now the A38 was a feature of this main turnpike route from north to south. Travellers needed accommodation and refreshment and horses needed to be changed. Newport, near Berkeley, had numerous inns, positioned as it was half way between Bristol and Gloucester.

It would be interesting to know when the inn or inns closed and had a change of use - perhaps once railways made travel more comfortable than a coach and horses.

By this time, the frequency of men consuming alcohol at the expense of their family life, causing much poverty and distress, had become a serious problem. In an effort to remedy the situation, those on the moral high ground and with sufficient wealth, bought licensed premises and closed them down. (For example, Sir Algar Howard bought a large inn at the top of Thornbury High Street called The Beaufort Arms and turned it into the Temperance Hotel and Coffee TavernThe site later became Thornbury Picture House, which itself has now long since gone.)

In the case of Brand Oak, Ann wondered if the Earl of Ducie purchased it to provide a home for the minister of Mount Pleasant Chapel before building the purpose-built house next door to it. This chapel was a Congregational establishment and was attached to the Congregational Chapel in Thornbury. Therefore, the word 'manse' would be applicable.

It appears that for the Fowler family living almost in Stone, the nearest Congregational chapel was at Mount Pleasant in Falfield. It was reported that up until the late 1930s, Miss Fowler, who was apparently an elderly lady (usually dressed entirely in black) walked every Sunday, in all weathers, from The Holloway to Mount Pleasant Chapel at to worship. She would have been Mrs Malpass's spinster aunt.

According to Jean Young's research for her book about Stone, 'A Parish Not Independent', these properties on the Stone/Falfield border in the 1600s were part of a much larger inn called 'The George', which gradually became split up into smaller units.

Most of those who might have been able to answer our questions have long since gone and sometimes we are tempted to put two and two together and arrive at five, which is most frustrating, but it keeps us occupied on cold winter nights!
