A Fond Farewell

I'm writing this as I prepare to take my last couple of services in Falfield, and indeed in CRoFTT Benefice. It's a bitter-sweet time as I am looking forward to a more relaxed lifestyle, but I will miss being with so many really lovely people. Thinking back over my time since retiring from full-time ministry, and moving back to Gloucestershire, has been a reflection on an interesting journey, and one or two "coincidences" make me think that God must have had a hand it in it.

Not long after my return in 2015, I met my training incumbent, Canon Michael Butler, who at that time was the Diocesan Retirement Officer; he very soon asked me if I was willing to become Bishop's Visitor to retired clergy in Wotton Deanery. This role led to my calling on Rev Sue Phillipson-Masters, and she asked whether I might be able to conduct an occasional service in the Benefice.

During 2016, the occasional service gradually developed into regularly conducting four or more services a month, with Roger also helping out by doing some Morning Prayer services. When the Diocese had no success in appointing a house-for-duty priest, in 2017 Sue and I were asked if we would commit to continue what we were doing for 3 years, to give time to review how ministry in the Benefice should proceed long term. We agreed and, for the next two years, I continued to take services in all the five churches, and to be involved in some other activities, although Sue always did far more than I did. In very early 2020, she asked me to chair Falfield PCC, to which I agreed.

Of course, no-one was expecting that, within weeks, services and meetings would cease as we started the first Covid lockdown. While continuing some online contact with Falfield folk, I regretted being suddenly cut off from my friends in the other parishes, and looked forward to the hoped for return to normal. Sadly, the Covid crisis has lasted far longer than anyone anticipated, with many people suffering terribly from illness, bereavement and isolation. Roger and I greatly missed our time in the Benefice, although were profoundly grateful (as I know many others were) to have a comfortable home, a garden, and the ability to supply our basic needs. Even when services restarted, the reduced number meant that I was still working almost entirely in Falfield, and it was a joy when folk from the other parishes joined us at St George's.

Covid disruption continued, and the original three years extended into 2021 then 2022. As many people know, my health has deteriorated somewhat during that time, and it seemed appropriate, as I approached my three-score-and-ten, that I should be thinking about "retiring" for a second time. So my final service on 28 August will be three days before my 70th birthday. In the event, Sue beat me to the finish line in the "Retirement Stakes" in May, and the Diocese has indicated that, in the fullness of time, the Benefice will be split, and the individual parishes will join in new groupings.

It is a time of transition for us all, when we need to trust where God may be leading us. I'm sure that all the parishes will be a blessing to their new benefices; the Church is not the building but the people, and all five churches have many Godly people who strive constantly for the Kingdom in prayer and action.

As I take my leave at the end of August, I will go with some lovely memories of my time with you, and the happy thought that we are bound to run into one another from time to time. You will always have a special place in my heart, and my thanks for the kindness that you have shown us both over nearly seven years. You will be much in our thoughts and prayers.

NEWS FROM TYTHERINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Tytherington Parish Council hope that all residents have enjoyed the summer this year and taken full advantage of the lovely weather. You will, no doubt, have seen the new Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) which is positioned along Stowell Hill Road and will hopefully make speeding drivers think again before they speed through the village. This sign will be moved around the village probably every 3 months and we can monitor the screen and also the speed of vehicles by using an Android phone.

You will also see new picnic tables on the Jubilee Field to commemorate the Platinum Jubilee of the Queen. These and the VAS have been bought with CIL money which has come to the village from the recent new developments. Community Infrastructure Levy Regulations 2010 (as amended) state that the parish or town council must spend the CIL income they receive from South Gloucestershire Council on: the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area. Our CIL fund stands at £41,491.78 but the Parish Council have earmarked £10,000 of this money to help the Village Hall fit solar panels to the roof of the building and the Clerk has completed a Grant application for a further £10,000, which is at present pending. The Parish Council own the Village Hall building but it is run under a Charity with 3 Trustees and Hall user representatives on the Management Committee. The above items were suggestions made from the last Consultation and if anyone has any ideas on how the current CIL money can be spent then please write to the Clerk at <u>clerk@tytherington-pc.gov.uk</u>. A large portion of the CIL money received from the Walnut Field development went towards the cost of the Village Store.

The Parish Council also has money available from Section 106. Section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 which is a legal agreement between an applicant having planning permission and the local planning authority, which is used to mitigate the impact of the new homes on the local community and infrastructure. New houses will mean more cars on the roads and more impact on local services. Section 106 is effectively a set of planning obligations for the developer.

Part of Section 106 is a financial contribution to the parish for assistance with meeting the needs of new residents living in the development through improvement of council assets.

The development of houses on Walnut Field and the Clements Farm development has resulted in funds possibly being available for children's outdoor sports to be spent on the Hardwicke Field amounting to £94,876.40 plus Capital Revenue o£ £29,103.46, and children and young people's play equipment to be spent on the Jubilee Field amounting to £51,847.12 plus capital revenue of £54.490.94. Several contractors have put in plans for both areas and a consultation will be sent to you all at the end of September. The Parish Council have to bid for this money together with any other eligible local organisations. Again, if any resident has any suggestions, please contact the Clerk at clerk@tytherington-pc.gov.uk.

The second round of the Community Benefit Funding is open to all Tytherington organisations. Applications need to be received by the Clerk by end of October for a decision in November. Details can be found on Community Grants – Tytherington Parish Council (tytherington-pc.gov.uk) and the form on TY-THERINGTON PARISH COUNCIL (google.com) together with the Policy

Cromhall Parish Council

A range of topics were raised by members of the public at the August parish council meeting:

Community Shop. The chair of the Community Shop came to explain the threat posed by the rising cost of electricity and the huge impact this will have on the shop. It could mean it may no longer be viable to keep the shop or the post office open going forwards from next May. This would be a great loss to the village, as some residents are very dependent on it. If you have any ideas about how the shop can increase its income or find innovative ways to pay for its electricity. I am sure they would be glad to hear from you.

Townwell Green. Several residents came to raise the issue of the poor maintenance of Townwell Green which remains the responsibility of the developer, Heathco Homes. Grass has only been cut once this year in May and residents have recently resorted to removing weeds and "docks" themselves. One major concern in this hot weather is the large pile of grass cutting left on site. The parish council has contacted the developer, as have local residents but it is disappointing to note that ongoing maintenance does not appear a priority. The matter will be raised with South Gloucestershire Council.

HMP Leyhill. Steve Hodson, Governor of Leyhill, gave an update explaining that the development at the prison is progressing slowly. although costs of the new buildings have risen considerably since the original plans were put in place. They are hoping work will start in the new year. He also allayed any community worries over the recent temporary release failures.



GLOUCESTERSHIRE ENERGY FROM WASTE

Built on what used to be Moreton Valence Airfield, Gloucestershire EfW uses non-recyclable wate to generate electricity by burning it at very high temperatures.

It became fully operational at the beginning of 2020 after much controversy. The county has minimised its reliance on landfill, thereby avoiding the production of methane, one of the more harmful greenhouse gases, as well as being able to

generate enough electricity to power around 25,000 homes. In addition, the facility recycles aggregates and metals recovered from the process.

The site has a dedicated Visitor Centre where educational tours, courses and workshops on the waste hierarchy and recycling, climate change, and sustainability are available for schools, colleges, universities, as well as adult and community education groups to support sustainability-themed courses. The Visitor Centre also provides an area for community meetings and events, wildlife and outdoor amenities, and a location for business network events and meeting spaces. Use of the Visitor Centre, site visits and tours must be arranged and booked directly through the project website. Gloucestershire Energy from Waste Facility operates under an Environmental Permit which was issued and is monitored by the Environment Agency.

September - month of Harvest Home, Hops and Apples



In the days of harvesting with hand tools, the 'Last Sheaf' of standing corn was always treated with great reverence, especially in northern and western

Britain. There it was known by many honorific titles: the Maiden or the *Cailleach* (old woman) in Scotland; the Neck or Gander's Neck in western England; the Mare in Herefordshire; and the *Caseg Fedi* (harvest mare) or *Gwrach* (hag) in Wales.

The last sheaf had to be cut in a particular manner. In Scotland, it was reaped by the youngest maiden or the youngest las on the farm, and must not touch the ground before being carried home in triumph. But in western England and Wales the standing corn was plaited together, all the reapers threw their sickles at it until one cut it down, whereupon he cried that he had 'got the Mare' or cut the

'Gander's Neck'.

However it was cut, the Last Sheaf was often dressed in women's clothes, or plaited into a 'Corn Dolly': 'she' then presided over the Harvest Home feast and was carefully kept for luck until the next harvest time.



The harvest swains and wenches bound For joy to see the hock-cart crown'd About the cart hear how the rout Of rural younglings raise the shout Some bless the cart; some kiss the sheaves Some prank them up with oaken leaves While other rusticks, less attent To prayers than to merryment Run after with their breeches rent.

Life as a Student Teacher in Saffron Walden 1887 - 1888

This is the final part of an article written by the head of a school in Bristol which the mother of one of our readers worked in the 1920s/30s.

Ringworm occurred at intervals, which meant those children were not allowed in school but we found they attended the Picture House and Sunday School, the latter for fear of missing out on the Sunday School outing. To counteract this, we sent weekly lists to the Sunday Schools of children not to be admitted. The School Attendance Officer policed the Pictures. Diphtheria broke out occasionally – six little ones died in one week.

Records of the absentees through sickness were kept and it was amazing how much grant was lost through sickness. This brought the average attendance down and again this depleted the salary of the Head Teacher.

The annual examination by the HMI was an ordeal for children and teachers. Such was the rigid discipline required that it was necessary the children should understand the importance of the occasion - with, I am afraid, a tinge of fear. Classes were large – 60, 70 and 80; perhaps rooms had to be shared. Teachers wore their best clothes on the day and children likewise, if they had any. All was very quiet and the atmosphere tense – waiting – and then the watchers would herald the approach of the great ones. We had our favourites - and hoped! After many years, no special date was fixed for the fixed visit – an unknown time would be less of a parade. So, as it was impossible to wear Sunday clothes (in those days special clothes for Sunday were kept) we had to take the chance and try to keep top level every day. Good reports must be obtained for the Education Rate must be kept down by earning the highest grants. Even so, we were allowed only the barest equipment. A small tin of paint cost me as much in postage as its worth. So many explanations were needed before it was granted.

In my third school, there was much less poverty; medical inspection had come, though many parents were reluctant to accept it.

A humble beginning for the Children's Rest was started – the children on the floor with a covering of old jackets, tablecloths, etc. This was condemned in the local evening paper as being unsuitable, so deck chairs were supplied but in these the posture of the children was bad and no covering was allowed.

However, gradually the rough places were made even, methods were improved, apparatus was attractive, and the school was a happy place.

We hoped that we did not qualify for Churchill's claim that: 'My education was interrupted only by my schooling.'

From Councillor John O'Neill



Cotswold Homes have submitted their planning application for 32 homes on land at the rear of Cromhall Chapel and the Showmans Site, the application is expected to deliver 11 affordable homes, the term affordable homes is defined as homes that will be purchased by a housing association for social rent, affordable rent and shared ownership.

The application will be available on the SGC planning portal very shortly for those who wish to make comments.

National Highways have once again requested the local planning authority to defer any decision on the major housing development sites at Charfield and Wickwar for a further 6 months because of the capacity issues at junction 14, a recently resubmitted application for one of the sites at Charfield indicated on the travel assessment that they had reached an agreement on a mitigation strategy for junction 14 with National Highways, but NH have since deferred any decision and asked developers to pause work to enable them to carry out further modelling of the junction, I would suggest that we are in a 'watch this space' scenario.

A re-opened rail station at Charfield will move to the planning application stage in the next 2 to 3 weeks; the station is designed to serve a 14,500 population within a 5km radius, so it is important that there are transport links from the other settlements to the station. Train services are expected to commence with an hourly service and hopefully move to a half-hourly service on the line from Gloucester, Cam, Charfield, Yate, Parkway, Filton Abbeywood and Temple Meads.

There is currently a government expansion of prisons programme that is looking to increase prison places in 2025 by 20,000 places. A recent planning approval will see the population of Leyhill increase by 120, a planning application to increase capacity at Eastwood Park is expected in the John O'Neill, john.oneill@southglos.gov.uk next few months.

St Martha's Kindergarten, Falfield



This photograph, taken in the mid-1950s, shows pupils at the small private school which operated in what is now the small hall at Falfield village hall. It was run solely by Mrs O.E. Truss (Miss Tayler) who lived at Lower Stone. She had opened the school in the late 1940s with just a handful of pupils but by this time it had grown considerably and flourished well into the 1960s. The age range extended from about 3 - 7 years.

Pupils, many of whom were the children of local farmers and business owners, were given a very thorough grounding in the 'three Rs' before they moved on to complete their education, mainly in the local state primary schools. The fact that they came not only from Falfield but a wide area including Tortworth, Stone, Wotton-under-Edge, Thornbury and Berkeley bears witness to the good reputation the school held.

One of its former pupils, Gillian Prosser, whose father was the vicar of Falfield between 1947-58 remembers:

It was not long before I found my way round to Miss Tayler's school; St Martha's. To get there I went through the gate between our house and the adjoining school and passed Mr Gatfield's (Gatty's) workroom.* As I remember he had been a prisoner of war and set up a watch and clock repair business in a shed in front of the girls toilets. They were all outside and the girls went to one block and the boys to another on the main yard. It was also here that we used to have classes outside in the summer and we all made hats to wear out of newspaper to keep the sun off us. I say 'all' but I think there were usually about 10 of us in the school. I remember when I first started that we used slates with scratchy slate pencils! Every morning without fail we all recited our times tables from 2 to 12 and I guess from then on none of us ever forgot them!

It was such a happy time and for me the trip to school took all of a minute. In those days the milk lady came with bottles of milk for us all and straws too (which we pushed through the cardboard lids on the bottles). When she delivered to us at home she came with churns and ladled it out into our own milk jugs; a pint or a quart or whatever we needed. Her name was Miss Nursaw from Chestnut Farm. (Later to become Mrs Hindley).

Every summer we would go on the school outing. This was to Thornbury on the bus and then to the recreation ground (Mundy playing fields) where we would paddle in the paddling pool and take a picnic. We thought it was such a treat. If we did not need hats we would make boats out of newspaper to sail on the pond!

AUDIENCES WELCOME RETURN OF THORNBURY ARTS FESTIVAL

The festival has run for more than 50 years and is usually staged over nine days in the spring, bringing world class and nationally acclaimed performers to the town in a programme of music, comedy, drama and talks.

The introduction of a guided walk has also been a popular addition and for this year it will be held on Sunday, September 18, when groups will be taken around "hidden Chepstow". It will include a visit to the Severn Princess ferry, which used to cross the river before the Severn Bridge opened in 1966.
