Sources of income –1. parental contributions 2. money for feeding programme, text books and teacher bonuses from CLinC.

Monthly allowances paid to teachers : between £30 and £45 from parental contributions but less if money is short.

Feeding programme

CLinC sends £170 per month for the feeding programme during term time to provide a hot, nutritious meal for all children on Fridays. This includes nshima (maize porridge), tuna chunks or small reconstituted fish, cabbage, onions and tomatoes.



Grants from other sources

Last term, St Anne's received a donation of exercise books, pencils and rulers from the Department of Education.

A 'well-wisher' donated £150 to enable St Anne's to connect to the electricity supply.

Text books

There is great shortage of text books, one book often shared between five children.

Grade 7 pupils – There are 24 grade 7 pupils this year, all hoping to transfer to government schools in Jan 2016.

School plans for future -

To run adult education classes to be held in evenings for local people and to cover the cost of electricity.

To acquire a laptop for school use.

To connect St Anne's to the water supply for hygiene purposes.

To provide tables and chairs for small children at St Mark's.
